

WEEKLY MUSING

"Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful." Luke 6:36

Shakespeare's *Measure for Measure* is a dark comedy set in Vienna. It has a plot with remarkably contemporary themes: seeking justice through violence, what to trust in a post-truth world and the rights of a woman over her body. Duke Vincentio, recognising he's been too lenient in his governance, leaves the city entrusting his minister Angelo to rule as he sees fit. He then comes back disguised as a friar to witness moral disintegration and chaos. Basically, Angelo condemns Claudio to death for immorality but then relents if Claudio's sister, Isabella who is a novice, sleeps with him. She agrees but organises his fiancé switch place with her. Being a comedy it all ends well, no-one is killed, the undisguised Duke determines just outcomes, matching couples together, including his own proposal of marriage to the virtuous Isabella. We're left with the supposition that she says yes, but being Shakespeare, her silence at the end remains a lingering unease. It's a depiction of a society, which, in losing its moral centre, can ultimately only find restoration and justice through mercy.

On the one hand, Jesus' teaching to his disciples in Luke 6 to 'love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you' sets an impossibly high benchmark. On the other hand, how easy it is for a society to slide into governing systems which involve sexual exploitation, manipulation of truth, and objectification of people in favour over compassionate, honest relationships. In pursuit of justice, David literally has Saul at his mercy in our reading from 1 Samuel. He can kill him easily if he choses. But he withdraws because he recognises it's not up to him to judge, but God. But what *is* David's matter is to call out and confront Saul for his menacing pursuit. And it's by this honest but merciful confrontation that Saul's heart is changed.

"A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back." Luke 6:38. *Metron* in the Greek is the standard or 'measure', the controlling basis by which something is determined acceptable or unacceptable. Christ is the ultimate 'measure' of truth. When equilibrium is lost and relationships are really messy, it's Christ's mercy that's needed to be called back into the centre of the discussion. All the characters in *Measure for Measure* are badly wanting in terms of living up to the Christian ideal of loving your enemies. But they are redeemed, as we can be, by the calling down of this quality of His mercy into all our relationships.

Having heard that David was hiding out in the desert, Saul rose and went down to the Wilderness of Ziph, with three thousand chosen men of Israel, to seek David in the Wilderness of Ziph. David and Abishai went into Saul's army by night; there Saul lay sleeping within the encampment, with his spear stuck in the ground at his head; and Abner and the army lay around him. Abishai said to David, "God has given your enemy into your hand today; now therefore let me pin him to the ground with one stroke of the spear; I will not strike him twice. But David said to Abishai, "Do not destroy him; for who can raise his hand against the Lord's anointed, and be guiltless?" So David took the spear that was at Saul's head and the water jar, and they went away. No one saw it, or knew it, nor did anyone awake; for they were all asleep, because a deep sleep from the Lord had fallen upon them. Then David went over to the other side, and stood on top of a hill far away, with a great distance between them. David called aloud to Saul, "Here is the spear, O king! Let one of the young men come over and get it. The Lord rewards everyone for his righteousness and his faithfulness; for the Lord gave you into my hand today, but I would not raise my hand against the Lord's anointed. As your life was precious today in my sight, so may my life be precious in the sight of the Lord, and may he rescue me from all tribulation." Then Saul said to David, "Blessed be you, my son David! You will do many things and will succeed in them." So David went his way, and Saul returned to his place.

THE GOSPEL

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke (6.27-38)

+ Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus addressed a great crowd of his disciples, together with the multitude from Judea, Jerusalem, Tyre and Sidon. "I say to you that listen: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who begs from you and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. Do to others as you would have them do to you. If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back."

NOTICES

Hall Roof Repairs

Our hall roof repair project will start shortly. Scaffolding will be erected on 21 February around the whole building. The project itself will start around 28 February, and last 10 to 12 weeks.

As far as possible, all entryways will be still accessible, including the window to the main kitchen for distribution of food packages. The main kitchen is not part of the renovation work.

In terms of impact on the wider precinct:

- 1. Removal of tiles and other debris from the roof will be deposited in the skip located near the main kitchen.
- 2. We will erect fencing around the two car spots closest to the main kitchen; those two car spots will temporarily be relocated on the other side of the parish carpark, facing Parliament house.
- 3. This will mean that there will be fewer carparks available for visitors, including visitors to Keble House.
- 4. The shade cloth and bins that are currently in the courtyard outside the hall will be removed
- 5. Entry to the site will be restricted for OHS reasons, however this should not restrict use of the tenanted components of the building.
- 6. Removing the roof and replacing the tiles will create dust in the areas below. The builder anticipates that this will mostly be in the mornings, it would be prudent for any computers and other machines to be covered at the end of every day, to protect them from any dust. I will be able to tell you when your areas of the building are likely to be affected by dust. The roof is going to be removed sequentially and so not every part of the roof is going to be affected every day.
- 7. The parish will pay for a deep clean of each of the tenanted areas at the end of the project.

I apologise for the disruption the project will cause, but I'm sure you're aware of the problems of water getting into the site and will welcome the outcome when it is complete.

Please feel free to contact me if you have any concerns, or if there is any uncertainty about what is to happen.

Child Safe Standards and Diocesan Safe Ministry Documents

Between now and June the Diocese's Safe Ministry Reference Group will be reviewing and editing the Diocese's safe ministry documents to ensure compliance. Updates will be reviewed and approved by Archbishop in Council before they are released to parishes by 1st July.


