
Vicar's Musings

On this Second Sunday of Advent we welcome members of the La Trobe Society to Mass, as we remember together one of the great Founders of St Peter's Eastern Hill, Charles Joseph La Trobe, Superintendent of the Port Phillip District of New South Wales from 1839-1851, and the first Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria from July 1851 until his retirement to England in May 1854. La Trobe was born in London on 20th March 1801 and died in the village of Litlington, West Sussex, on 4th December 1875.

A devoted Christian all his life, La Trobe was born into a Huguenot family whose beliefs and actions were based in the Moravian faith. He and his family were parishioners at St Peter's Eastern Hill during their years in Melbourne, and members of the church of St Michael the Archangel, Litlington, England, at the time of his death. La Trobe was buried in the St Michael's churchyard where a white marble cross marks his grave.

Mrs Sophie La Trobe was in ill health during the couple's last years in Victoria and preceded her husband to Europe to recover, but sadly she died at her family home on 30th January 1854 before her husband could reach her. In a letter dated 27th July 1855 La Trobe wrote to a friend concerning a memorial plaque to be erected here at St Peter's: "My dear Macarthur ... I have taken the liberty to direct my agent Mr W McMahon to address & ship to you by the 'Hebonheath' sailing next month a package containing a Tablet in memory of my dear late wife, designed to be erected in such a position in St Peter's Church as the authorities may direct & permit. I have consulted nothing but my own feeling & pen in the inscription & hope that it will be held to be unobjectionable & to the point. I think that she deserves to be remembered in the community of which she was so long a member."

Each year we commemorate at Mass the life and work of our former parishioner, and his beloved wife is also very much in our thoughts and prayers at this time. We send our greetings todays to the Rev'd Prebendary Stephen Stuckes, Vicar of St Michael the Archangel, Litlington, and to the congregation who will also be commemorating Governor La Trobe at their Mass later today.




Sunday Mass Readings

First Reading: Isaiah 40.1-5, 9-11

Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins. A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken. Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!" See, the Lord God comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him. He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep.

Psalm 85.8ab+9, 10-11, 12-13



Let me hear what God the Lord will speak, for he will speak peace to his people.

Surely his salvation is at hand for those who fear him, that his glory may dwell in our land.

R. Steadfast love and faithfulness will meet; righteousness and peace will kiss each other.

Faithfulness will spring up from the ground, and righteousness will look down from the sky.

R. The Lord will give what is good, and our land will yield its increase.

Righteousness will go before him, and will make a path for his steps.

Second Reading: 2 Peter 3.8-15

Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed. Since all these things are to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be in leading lives of holiness and godliness, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set ablaze and dissolved, and the elements will melt with fire? But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home. Therefore, beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish; and regard the patience of our Lord as salvation.

Gospel: Mark 1.1-8

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight," John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."


