### WELCOME TO ST PETER'S

COVID-19 restrictions permit a limited number at public worship. The sidespeople are required to check your name off against their list, if you have booked in advance, or otherwise you must leave them with your name and phone number (you may do this by using the QR code at the door). For those unable to attend today in person, the service will be live-streamed and recorded online through FaceBook (www.facebook.com/stpeterseasternhill) and YouTube (www.youtube.com/c/StPetersEasternHill).

Please read carefully and observe all the requisite COVID-Safe guidelines below. If you have any questions, the sidespeople will be able to help you.

- If you are feeling unwell, you should not be at church; go home and get tested immediately.
- For COVID-19 symptomatic persons (or close contacts) and those self-isolating, you must not under any circumstances come to church.
- For the safety of others, you must maintain spatial distancing of 1.5m at all times the only exception being your immediate family (e.g. marriage partners & dependent children).
- When in church you must wear a mask at all times. Service leaders and readers may remove their mask while speaking, and similarly the cantor while singing.
- Please make use of the hand sanitiser, by the West Door, as you enter and leave church.
- Do not to shake hands, hug, or kiss others beyond your immediate family.
- All service booklets are single-use only, so please take yours home.

To amend our lives according to your holy word.

Holy God, holy and strong, holy and immortal:

Have mercy on us.

The deacon introduces the confession. Please sit or kneel.

The Lord comes, bringing to light things now hidden in darkness, and disclosing the purposes of the heart. *Silence*.

Let us open our hearts and prepare for his coming, confessing our sins in penitence and faith.

Merciful God, our maker and our judge,

We have sinned against you

In thought, word, and deed,

And in what we have failed to do:

We have not loved you with our whole heart;

We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves;

We repent and are sorry for all our sins.

Father, forgive us.

Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life; Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The celebrant pronounces the absolution:

Almighty God,

Who has promised forgiveness of sins to all those who turn to him in faith:

+ pardon you and set you free from all your sins, strengthen you in all goodness and keep you in eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.** 

The celebrant chants the collect for the day:

Eternal God, through long generations
You prepared a way for the coming of your Son,
And by your Spirit you still bring light to illumine our paths:
Renew us in faith and hope that we may welcome Christ
To rule our thoughts and claim our love;
To whom with you and the Holy Spirit,
Be glory for ever and ever. **Amen.** 

## THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

Please be seated.

FIRST TESTAMENT READING: Isaiah 63:16b-17; 64:1, 3-8 read by Daniel Ferguson. You, O Lord, are our father; "Our Redeemer from of old" is your name. Why, O Lord, do you make us stray from your ways and harden our heart, so that we do not fear you? Turn back for the sake of your servants, for the sake of the tribes that are your heritage. O that you would tear open the heavens and come down,

so that the mountains would quake at your presence. When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him. You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed. We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth. We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away. There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you; for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity. Yet, O Lord, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand.

Glory to you + Lord Jesus Christ.



This is the Gospel of the Lord.




Celebrant: Let us proclaim the mystery of faith ...
