The celebrant prays the following collect at the Nativity station.

Eternal God, who by a star led the Magi to the worship of your Son: guide the nations of the earth by your light, that the whole world may see your glory, and show yourself to all the nations; through him who is the true light and the bright morning star, Jesus Christ your Son our Lord. **Amen.** 

The sanctuary party re-enters the chancel. The celebrant censes the altar during the Introit.

#### **ENTRANCE ANTIPHON**

After the Lord was baptised, the heavens were opened, and the Spirit descended upon him like a dove, and the voice of the Father thundered: This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased.

V. O sing a new song to the Lord, for he has worked wonders. His right hand and his holy arm have wrought salvation.

The celebrant pronounces the Absolution.

Almighty God, who has promised forgiveness to all pardon you and set you free from all your sins, strengthen you in all goodness and keep you in eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Kyries are sung at 9.30am and sung by the choir at 11.00am

Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy Christ have mercy, Christ have mercy Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy

Please then stand for the Gloria which is sung at 9.30am and sung by the choir at 11.00am.

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.



# Weekly Reflections

The Holy Spirit hovers on the face of the waters – waters of chaos, of an unformed world. And in the presence of that Spirit, in the presence of the Word that speaks – *Let there be light!* – light comes into being. With the coming of light, creation itself is loved into existence. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

This is what we see as the beginning of the story, although it was written much later than much of the Hebrew bible, possibly as late as the third century. This is the mythology of a community struggling with the loss of its autonomy, coming to terms with the reality of life under empire: first the destruction of all they hold dear under the might of Babylon, and then life as a subjugated people under the admittedly gentler yoke of Persian authority. This is a people who need to remind themselves of who they are, of what they hold dear. And they do that, at least in part, by reminding themselves that the very reality in which they live is brought into being by the *ruach* – the wind, or Spirit – of the God who has set them apart as a holy people.

It is that same Spirit which is present as our Lord comes, some three hundred or more years after the writing of the book of Genesis (and some four million or so years after the events the creation narratives depict), to be baptised in the Jordan. That same Spirit of creation – literally *pneuma*, or breath, the breath of God – descends on him at the moment he emerges from the river, and claims him as God's own, and as loved by God. In Jesus, the Word of God through whom creation emerged, God is fully present in creation. God is fully incarnated in the experience of humanity – and yet remains fully God, drawing that human experience into the love of the Creator.

Most of us do not remember our own baptisms, our own experience of that gift given freely and abundantly and without our understanding or even knowledge. For many of us, our baptism is merely an event long ago in our past — and yet for all of us, it is an event which changes everything. Just as the Holy Spirit is present at the baptism of our Lord, so it is present at our own baptism — perhaps not visible or even recognised, but as present as it is for Apollos and the disciples in this week's narrative from Acts, as present as it is over the face of the waters of the unformed earth.

In our very humanity – our status as creatures of the Creator – we are loved by God. In our baptism, we claim that love, or have it claimed for us by those who trustingly bring us for baptism. In our baptism, we claim ourselves as creatures of the Creator, as people of God, set aside and marked forever.

Jesus at his baptism is claimed as the Son of God, the beloved; in the same way, so we are claimed by the Creator of the Universe: We are the Beloved of God.
