

CHRIST THE KING 24th November 2019

Eternal God, you exalted Jesus Christ to rule over all things, and have made us instruments of his kingdom: by your Spirit empower us to love the unloved, and to minister to all in need, then at the last bring us to your eternal realm where we may be welcomed into your everlasting joy and may worship and adore you for ever; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

Vicar's Musings

Today we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. Although clearly true in a theological sense, it is an ironic title. The soldiers in Luke's gospel nail a sign above his head, designed to humiliate the trouble-maker they are executing: "This is the King of the Jews." To the early readers and hearers of the gospel the irony was clear. They too had been persecuted for their faith. Their royal courts were in the catacombs and private houses where they held their secret and subversive acts of Eucharist; their Christian love feasts. Decades later, when the days of martyrdom were over, others then chose to go into the desert, seeking the "white martyrdom" of self-denial and ascetic discipline. The kingdom of heaven was to be found in detachment and humility not riches or earthly power.

This all changed on 28th October 312 AD when the armies of competing Roman Emperors, Constantine and Maxentius, slogged it out on Milvian Bridge for control of Rome and ultimately the entire Empire. Constantine had seen a vision prior to the battle, and made a pact with God that if he won he would become a Christian. He did indeed win, and then began the Constantinian era of Christianity that remained powerfully in place until unsettled by the pluralism of the Reformation, deconstructed by the intellectual critique of the Enlightenment, and then arguably delivered a death-blow by twentieth-century securalism and materialism.

The Constantinian era was one of warrior lord bishops, royal religion, regal cathedrals, and a church that played power politics with the big boys. This Christ was King in a very earthly and material sense. So much of our church hierarchy, architecture, liturgy and theology, even to this day hails from this period. A plain reading of the gospels runs so profoundly counter to this. The coronation of Christ was on the cross, not in a mighty temple or cathedral; at his right hand was no powerful bishop or righteous lawyer, but a criminal: "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

The irreparable disintegration of the Constantinian model of Christ the King arguably came in the 1960s with the Death-of-God debate, although the current era of the Royal Commission is certainly making sure that the lid of the coffin is well and truly nailed down. Painful and humiliating as it is, this era could arguably be seen as our ecclesiological salvation. The biblical and early church crowning of Christ the King was never meant to be about worldy power; it was, and still is, a vision of how things can be so radically different in a broken world. Our regal Saviour turns power structures and hierarchies on their head. The angels rejoice equally, as the homelessness woman kneeling at the altar-rail alongside the rich man, reach out their hands in humility and faith to receive the gift and mystery of Holy Eucharist.



Mass Readings

First Reading: 2 Samuel 5.1-3

All the tribes of Israel came to David at Hebron, and said, "Look, we are your bone and flesh. For some time, while Saul was king over us, it was you who led out Israel and brought it in. The Lord said to you: 'It is you who shall be shepherd of my people Israel, you who shall be ruler over Israel." So all the elders of Israel came to the king at Hebron; and King David made a covenant with them at Hebron before the Lord, and they anointed David king over Israel.

Second Reading: Colossians 1.12-20

Give thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. The Father has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins. Christ is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers - all things have been created through him and for him. Christ is before all things, and in him all things hold together. Christ is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so

that he might come to have first place in everything. For in Christ all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

Gospel: Luke 23.35-43

When Jesus had been crucified, the people stood by watching; the leaders scoffed at him saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" The soldiers also mocked Jesus, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" There was also an inscription over Jesus, "This is the King of the Jews." One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding Jesus and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."



BUSHFIRE APPEAL BUSHFIRE EMERGENCY APPEAL

PARISH SUPPORT TEAM PROGRESS AND NEXT STEPS

Following the Statutory Meeting earlier this year, Bishop Genieve appointed a 'Parish Support Team' to work with the St Peter's leadership and congregations to resolve conflict and address ongoing issues. At the conclusion of the six-month process, Bishop Genieve and the Support Team met with Parish Council members, clergy, employees, and coordinators of many of the volunteer ministries of the parish on 12 November.

The report that the Bishop presented to that meeting is included in the Annual Meeting papers, available from the Welcome Table today and posted on the website. For the past two months Parish Council has been working on a 'Reflections' discussion document designed to help us move forward together as a Parish; this is also circulated with the Annual Meeting papers today. We invite parishioners to engage with this Parish Council Reflections paper in writing ahead of the Annual Meeting, or in person at the meeting itself. There is obviously still a lot of unfinished business to be worked through, and this will be a big part of the agenda for our new Parish Council. Four main issues on the 2020 Parish Council's agenda will be:

- 1) providing avenues and forums for us as a parish to continue discussing and working through issues that have arisen, including potentially developing a Covenant for the Parish Council and maybe the wider parish.
- 2) working on implementation of the Pastoral Care Review, which was set up following the Statutory Meeting. This will be led by a working group consisting of me as Chair, Fr Hugh, Peter Yewers, and Di Clark.
- 3) establishing a review of governance, roles and responsibilities as endorsed by the special meeting.
- 4) completing the parish's 2020-22 Mission Action Plan. The Vicar and Wardens will be convening a series of leadership retreats and planning days to help Parish Council address these priorities. Please contact me if you want to discuss any of these issues.

The festive season can be a lonely and depressing time for those on the margins of society, so these hampers can often bring a little joy to those who have very little. If you would like to support this community outreach, your donation of items such as the following will be gratefully received:

- small Christmas puddings and cakes
- tins of ham, turkey and chicken (ring pull or key opening)
- tins of vegetables (ring pull)
- shortbread and other Christmas biscuits
- sweets, lollies, chips and chocolates
- cans of soft drink
- small jar of coffee (50g) & packets of tea bags (25pk)
- small packets of sugar and UHT long-life milk
- Christmas cards

NOTE: A request has been made for NO mince pies this year.

While not limited to Christmas hampers, toiletries are also handy items - things like: toothpaste & brushes, shampoo & conditioner, disposable safety razors, deodorant, soap (small packages or hotel size).

NOTE that most of the clients are single people, so individually packaged items are best, or small packets - as family sized packages are often difficult to break down to smaller sizes for distribution.

All donations will need to be with us by **Thursday 12th December** <u>at the latest</u>, as the following weekend the team of elves (err, volunteers) will begin sorting and packing the hampers. With grateful thanks in anticipation.






