WELCOME TO ST PETER'S


Please read carefully and observe all the requisite COVID-Safe guidelines below:

- If you are feeling unwell, especially with COVID-19-type symptoms, you must not be at church; please go home now and get tested.
- Masks are not mandatory, but you are encouraged to wear them if you can't socially distance or when you sing.
- The 2m² density quotient at St Peter's allows for up to 110 people in the pews, and a total congregation (including choir, servers, children's church, overflow etc) of up to 174 people.
- 2m² spatial distancing essentially means keeping an elbow's distance from others at all times (other than partners and immediate family members).
- We provide sanitiser for your hands at the entrance to church.
- Holy Communion is in one kind only, with no common cup.
- You are advised not to shake hands, hug, or kiss others beyond your partner or immediate family.
- All service booklets are single use only, so please take yours home.

When you arrive at church you must "sign in" using the new State Government approved QR Code system at the door. If you have any difficulties, the sidesperson will assist you.

Please note: we have a busy programme of worship, social service and hall bookings at St Peter's Eastern Hill, seven days a week, but the church and hall are cleaned and sanitised daily, under WorkSafe pandemic guidelines, so you can be assured of the cleanliness of our buildings and furnishings.

Weekly Musings

Anzac Day almost always falls towards the end of Eastertide. On the one hand, we are celebrating a victory over death, a victory which continues to transform people every day, but which requires us to recommit every day to walk the path of peace and love. On the other hand, we also remember that we fall off that path of peace and love and end up in war – with all the tragedies that entails.

I visited ANZAC Cove in 2018 as part of a study tour encountering the Bible Lands. There were four Australians in our group and we recited the Ode in front of the memorial, which moved us deeply. ANZAC Cove is a thin place – where we feel and are haunted by the terrible loss of life that occurred there, and the wounds – medical and physical – which left a terrible continuing legacy.

War is terrible. It impacts directly on those who serve, not only through the tragedy of deaths – often deaths of youths – but also the ongoing scarring that war brings. Civilian populations lose homes and livelihoods, and civilians also suffer death, rape, and physical and mental wounds.

Sometimes the whole population accepts the justification for a war, but over the last few decades, the decision to go to war has been more contested, and this makes the deaths and ongoing trauma generated by those wars even more tragic.

Today, we remember those who lost their lives in war, and we pray that the peace which comes from listening to Jesus may guide leaders to eschew conflict as a way to resolve international disputes. We pray also that Jesus' healing love is felt by those who continue to suffer from the effects of war.

Sunday Mass Readings

First Reading: Acts 4.7-12

While Peter and John were speaking to the people about the resurrection of Jesus, the captain of the temple arrested them and placed them in custody. The next day the rulers, elders and scribes assembled. When they had made the prisoners stand in their midst, they inquired, "By what power or by what name did you do this?" Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them, "Rulers of the people and elders, if we are questioned today because of a good deed done to someone who was sick and are asked how this man has been healed, let it be known to all of you, and to all the people of Israel, that this man is standing before you in good health by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead. This Jesus is 'the stone that was rejected by you, the builders; it has become the cornerstone.' There is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved."

Second Reading: 1 John 3.1-2

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is.

Gospel: John 10.11-18

Jesus said to the Pharisees: "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away - and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

NEW CHECK-IN QR SYSTEM FOR THE PARISH - "GUEST TRACK"

In line with the Victorian State Government's new regulations, implemented last Friday, St Peter's is required to adopt a new QR Code system: "GuestTrack." Please be patient, and kind towards our sidespeople, as we get this new system up and running. Thank you.
