

SENIOR CHAPLAIN'S REFLECTIONS

t's been an eventful year at RMIT chaplaincy as St Peter's continues to lead an ever-growing mutli-faith team. Here's an overview of some of the things we've been up to this semester.

RMIT Inaugural Iftar

Chaplaincy has proudly advocated for and organised RMIT's inaugural Iftar, which is the traditional meal during Ramadan to break the daily fast. The Iftar took place on Wednesday 22 May in the Green Brain dining room, an impressive venue that commands a sweeping view of Melbourne's skyline, and was attended by Vice-Chancellor of RMIT Martin Bean, with the keynote address by Race Commissioner from the Australian Human Rights Commission Mr Chin Tan. The meal brought together communities from different faith traditions--and those with no faith tradition--in a spirit of friendship and hospitality.

Memorial services

It's undoubtedly been a challenging year for inter-faith relations in the world, with the massacres in Christchurch and then Sri Lanka highlighting how much work there is yet to do in combating hate speech and bringing alienated communities together. This semester alone multi-faith chaplaincy has held six memorial services for Christchurch and Sri Lanka respectively across our three Melbourne campuses.

Pride Week

Multi-faith chaplaincy is committed to spreading the Gospel imperative of love and inclusion to all communities and we were proud to participate in RMIT's second Pride Week, to coincide with IDAHOBIT Day. Last year, chaplaincy hosted a panel on faith and sexuality-this year we took a "pop up" approach distributing food at the careers fair for LGTBIQ+friendly organisations. Not only was out food cart an opportunity to engage with students, it also provided an opportunity for us to increase the visibility of chaplaincy services and build linkages with the LGTBIQ+ community.

Welcome Dinners

In partnership with the Welcome Dinner Project, a national not-for-profit organisation that runs dinners aimed at bringing established and newly arrived Australians together, chaplaincy has launched a pilot project to run four dinners annually that are expertly facilitated by the Welcome Dinner Project, with the support of chaplaincy, aimed at bridging the gap between recently arrived international students and staff and established RMIT staff and students. The first dinner took place 22 March and was a huge success, attended by fifty students and staff. It brought together students and staff from countries as diverse as Iran, Lebanon, China, Pakistan, Ireland and Samoa. We hope this dinner and subsequent dinners will provide a real opportunity for staff and students to form lasting connections.

As busy as we've been, our 2019 programme is far from over, as we contemplate a Christmas event and our annual participation in NAIDOC Week. On a lay ministry side I can distil the coming few weeks to two words: Corpus Christi. Our inaugural 2018 celebration was a huge success--here's to an even better one in 2019!

ELECTION OF SYNOD LAY REPRESENTATIVES - SUN 16TH JUNE


The Archbishop has called for an election of Lay Representatives for the Fifty-Third Synod of the Diocese of Melbourne. St Peter's will be need to elect two Lay Representatives and an Alternate Lay Representative. An election has been set for Sunday 16th June, should it be required. Nomination forms are available at the back of church and on the Welcome Table. Nominations close on Saturday 8th June.

Mass Readings

First Reading: Acts 15.1-2, 22-29

Certain individuals came down from Judea and were teaching the brothers, "Unless you are circumcised according to the custom of Moses, you cannot be saved." And after Paul and Barnabas had no small dissension and debate with them, Paul and Barnabas and some of the others were appointed to go up to Jerusalem to discuss this question with the apostles and the elders. Then the apostles and the elders, with the consent of the whole church, decided to choose men from among their members and to send them to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas. They sent Judas called Barsabbas, and Silas, leaders among the brothers, with the following letter: "The brothers, both the apostles and the elders, to the believers of Gentile origin in Antioch and Syria and Cilicia, greetings. Since we have heard that certain persons who have gone out from us, though with no instructions from us, have said things to disturb you and have unsettled your minds, we have decided unanimously to choose representatives and send them to you, along with our beloved Barnabas and Paul, who have risked their lives for the sake of our Lord Jesus Christ. We have therefore sent Judas and Silas, who themselves will tell you the same things by word of mouth. For it has seemed good to the Holy Spirit and to us to impose on you no further burden than these essentials that you abstain from what has been sacrificed to idols, and from blood and from what is strangled, and from fornication. If you keep yourselves from these, you will do well. Farewell." "For it has seemed good to the Holy Spirit and to us to impose on you no further burden than these essentials:

Second Reading: Revelation 21.10-14, 22-23

In the spirit the angel carried me away to a great, high mountain and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God. It has the glory of God and a radiance like a very rare jewel, like jasper, clear as crystal. It has a great, high wall with twelve gates, and at the gates twelve angels, and on the gates are inscribed the names of the twelve tribes of the Israelites; on the east there were three gates, on the north three gates, on the south three gates, and on the west three gates. And the wall of the city has twelve foundations, and on them are the twelve names of the twelve apostles of the Lamb. I saw no temple in the city, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb.

Gospel: John 14.23-29

Jesus said to his disciples: "Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them. Whoever does not love me does not keep my words; and the word that you hear is not mine, but is from the Father who sent me. I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. You heard me say to you, 'I am going away, and I am coming to you.' If you loved me, you would rejoice that I am going to the Father, because the Father is greater than I. And now I have told you this before it occurs, so that when it does occur, you may believe."






This week St Peter's Bookroom popped up for two conferences. At each conference we connected with different authors whose books we sell and recommend:
