Vicar's Musings

This week I received an e-mail from a parishioner: "[We] have been watching and enjoying the Sunday service on YouTube thank you so much. You and Fr Philip and the small team have been conducting the services in such a dignified and uplifting manner and the church has looked most beautiful as usual. Excellent work by Rhys and the cantor thank you. We were surprised to hear in your sermon that St Peter's social enterprise is now handing out some 500 meals each day and has a sizable team of university student volunteers. We wondered about the logistics of all that. Is it all done via the coffee cart or the courtyard? At what times? Just trying to understand how you have achieved that."

Our "Heaven at The Hill" meal program has become a key component of mission at St Peter's since the lock-down, but the e-mail made me realise that many parishioners are unaware of this new outreach of our church. So I thought I would share my response with you here: "How lovely to hear from you Thank you for your kind words. The growth of the meal distribution program has indeed been truly remarkable; God's grace actually. It began the week of the 23rd March, when the Parliament kitchen manager rang me to ask if our social enterprise would be interested in distributing food to those affected by the pandemic. Because this new undertaking was to be social service (free food) rather than social enterprise (selling coffee) we thought it would save any confusion if we separated it from the coffee caravan. So, I spoke to the Wardens, and they agreed to "Heaven at The Hill" using the Hall kitchen and courtyard for distribution. The Parliament kitchen cooks all the food and pre-packages it in single-serve containers. We then pick these up each morning, and bag them up into one-week's worth of meals, for distribution; along with staples such as bread, eggs and milk, as available. We commence each day at 9.30am after the Breakfast Program has finished, so as not to confuse the two distinct programs."

"At first my wife, Ree, administered things singlehandedly, but then the 60 meals became 100 each day, and so we took on more volunteers. The big shift in gear came when RMIT University came on board through our Lay Minister Alae Taule'alo and our leadership of the Chaplaincy program there. International students are Melbourne's new poor at the moment. So many have lost their casual jobs, are not entitled to JobSeeker or Centrelink, can't go home, and have parents who are on lockdown and out of work

themselves overseas. The 100 meals became 200, then 400, and we now distribute as many as 500 meals each day. Most people visit us at St Peter's to pick up, but we also deliver to other distribution hubs through our contacts in Hoppers Crossing, Corio, Sunshine and Sunbury."

"The dramatic growth in student volunteers has been another blessing. Our daughter, Hannah, was initially instrumental in this. She and her friend, both RMIT students, were the first volunteers to help Ree. They then encouraged their friends to help, and the numbers grew quickly. There are now 19 students volunteering; a number of them in necessitous circumstances themselves. And two parents of one of the volunteers have become our main delivery drivers, filling up their car a couple of times each week to take food to our suburban delivery hubs. I hope that answers some of your questions. It has been a phenomenal development of our church outreach, which through Ree's incredibly hard work, and God's grace, has grown exponentially in just 8 weeks. Sadly, it also reflects the desperation that so many young people and others are facing in this time of pandemic. Kind regards, Fr Hugh."

Milestone for Victorian Parliament's kitchens preparing meals for people in need

More than 100,000 meals have been prepared in the Victorian Parliament's kitchens for vulnerable community members during the COVID-19 emergency.

"We want to acknowledge this significant milestone and thank the wonderful community-minded organisations that are working with us on this initiative," Legislative Council President Shaun Leane said.

"We're glad that a public asset is being used for the good of the community in partnership with organisations that each and every day are working for the benefit of people in need," Mr Leane said.

The partner organisations for this meals program are The Salvation Army, The Lazarus Centre, St Peter's Eastern Hill Anglican Church, Heaven At The Hill social enterprise, the Father Bob Maguire Foundation, Melbourne City Mission, St Vincent de Paul Society and St Mary's House of Welcome.

Parliament's 2019-20 appropriation is being used to support the program with \$283,000 spent in the month of April 2020. As some of Parliament's planned activities could not be undertaken due to COVID-19, some of the funds have been directed to this meals program.

"We've drawn on the parliamentary budget to make this initiative happen. We're glad that savings in the Parliament's budget are allowing us to assist vulnerable community members during this difficult time," Legislative Assembly Speaker Colin Brooks said.

"Using these funds to deliver this program has kept our parliamentary catering staff in jobs and provided work for agency staff who have been regulars with us," Mr Brooks said.


Inspired by the Victorian example, other Australian parliaments have initiated similar meals programs for vulnerable members of their communities. "This is a positive example of people working together to support each other through this emergency," Mr Leane said. "During National Volunteer Week we want to particularly thank the many volunteers who are helping our partner charities distribute the meals prepared at Parliament House. These volunteers are a daily source of inspiration for all of us," Mr Brooks added.



Second Reading: 1 Peter 4.13-16


ST PETER'S BOOKROOM & CHURCH SUPPLIES
