




THE LITURGY OF THE WORD







WEEKLY MUSINGS

Today's Gospel from John 13 has a tripartite structure, which may be summed up as 1. Jesus prefiguring his departure from the world 2. Jesus saying that "now" is the hour of his glorification, and 3. Jesus instructing his disciples to love one another as he has loved them. All three sections contain key Christological statements about who Jesus is. The first affirms Jesus' connection to the Father and his departure from the world to the Father. It also reinforces the connection between Jesus and his disciples, which is grounded in love. The second reinforces the indissoluble relationship between Jesus and the Father, as the glorification of one is the glorification of the other. The last again affirms Jesus' return to the Father but this time re-capitulates the theme of love: because Jesus loves his disciples, his disciples are to love one another. There is much to unpack in these passages of John; I'd like to examine the central section, which speaks of Jesus' glorification. What is striking about this section is the immediacy of Jesus' language. In the New Revised Standard Version translation of John, Jesus prefaces his glorification with "Now"—which we can understand to mean "I am being glorified as we speak" or "I have only just been, or am about to be glorified". This emphasis on time may seem academic, but in fact God's time is central not only to the Incarnation but also to God's plan of salvation. Cyril of Alexandria, in his sermon on John 13, names the immediacy of Jesus' language as something that requires analysis. "We must now inquire what manner of glorification [to which Jesus] now specially alludes; for some perhaps may say: Was He not surely glorified before this, by the mighty wonders which He wrought?" Cyril refers to many examples of Jesus' glorification in the

Gospels—in John alone the turning of water into wine, the healing of the official's son in Capernaum and the feeding of the five thousand near the Sea of Galilee come to mind. These are undoubtedly instances where Christ's glory was readily and clearly manifested. Cyril does not dispute these miracles as signs of Jesus' Divine authority and glory. But he points us more clearly in the direction of what Jesus is referring to at that juncture in John. Cyril says: "The perfect consummation of His glory and the fulness of His fame were summed up in the facts of His suffering for the life of the world and opening by His own resurrection the gate through which all may rise." In other words, Jesus' ultimate glorification—which will also glorify the Father—will be the imperishable and unceasing life he attains after he has risen from the dead. Were this something particular to Jesus it would still be remarkable—but the hope for us lies in the eternal life Jesus's suffering and death has purchased for creation. As Cyril says, "in Himself He raises the whole of nature". Because Jesus has risen, we are promised also to rise, no more subject to death but endowed with endless life.

We can understand the particular glorification Jesus refers to in John 13 as his victory over suffering and death, and our participation in that victory as his disciples. We participate in this victory in many ways: by following Christ's commandment to love one another as he has loved us and by drinking his blood and eating his flesh at Mass. In a more ineffable way, we share in his glorification by, in the words of Cyril: "Casting away the defilement of sin [and adorning] our lives in all the beauty of good works."


