WELCOME TO ST PETER'S


Our restrictions and rules for Mass often change in these pandemic times. Please read carefully and observe all the updated COVID-Safe guidelines below:

- If you are feeling unwell, especially with COVID-19-type symptoms, you must not be at church; please go home now and get tested.
- Masks are now <u>mandatory</u> again indoors. Only the person leading or speaking in a service can be unmasked.
- The passing round of the collection plate during the Offertory Hymn is no longer allowed, to prevent multiple people touching this object. For this reason there will now be a retiring collection in its place at the end of each Mass.
- Our current density quotient at St Peter's allows for up to 110 people in the pews, and a total congregation (including choir, servers, children's church, overflow etc) of up to 174 people.
- If you have booked a pew, a sidesperson will tick off your name on arrival.
- If you have not booked, you can scan the QR Code on your smart phone, or just give us your first name and phone number.
- The 2sqm spatial distancing rule essentially means keeping an elbow's distance from others at all times (other than partners and immediate family members).
- Please continue to sanitise your hands as you enter or leave church.
- Communion will continue in one kind only, with no common cup.
- Do not to shake hands, hug, or kiss others beyond your immediate family.
- All service booklets are single use only, so please take yours home.

Please note: we have a busy programme of worship and social service at St Peter's Eastern Hill, seven days a week, but the church and hall are cleaned and sanitised daily, under WorkSafe pandemic guidelines, so you can be assured of the cleanliness of our buildings and furnishings.

A Word from the Vicar - Out of Lockdown (again)

Well, we are out of lock-down (again) but thankfully just a five-day stint this time – a mere blink compared to 111 days – and almost back to where we were before. You may be interested to read the Archbishop's COVID-Safe update, which makes it clear where we now stand: "Church services can resume face to face with the 2sqm rule where electronic booking or QR codes are operating. Masks must be worn indoors and outdoors, apart from the one person leading/singing at that time. Weddings and funerals can occur as previously under the same density rules for church services. Only five visitors can be at a private home, inside or out, so this may affect small groups or home meetings. Public gatherings are limited to twenty people but this does not apply to community groups, church meetings or religious services. However, such groups must be on church property and not in public places."


Probably the biggest impact for us as a faith community at St Peter's has been the canceling of our public Ash Wednesday services. I have spoken to a number of parishioners since then who have experienced this as a ripping out of the heart of the start of Lent. I am inclined to agree. We held two small services online (https://bit.ly/2Zwrane), but these of course lack the physicality of our usual practices. One option was to incorporate the imposition of ashes into our Sunday Masses, but after carefully considering this, and discussing the possibility with some of our priests and servers, I decided against it. Sundays are a feast day, and the first Sunday of Lent always opens at St Peter's with a penitential Litany.

That being said, if you are feeling bereft, you may like to conduct a simple liturgy at home, before attending Mass this Sunday. You could burn last year's palm cross (if you have it) and then impose ashes on yourself, or with another member of your household. Take a look at the 'The Imposition of Ashes at Home', a liturgy authorised and published by the Church of England (https://bit.ly/3k93TBp) that you may wish to use while or after watching one of our online Ash Wednesday liturgies.

This Sunday, the first Sunday of Lent, we are essentially back to the way we were before the snap lock-down (other than mandatory wearing of masks at worship again). We are also going ahead with the planned introduction of two additional Sunday Masses: 9am BCP Mass and 6pm APBA Mass. The 10.30am High Mass with Children's Church will continue as before the lock-down, and in due course we plan to

introduce a second group in the Hall, although not this week as we've not yet finalised a roster of teachers to make this happen each week.

Please note also that the "thank you" morning tea for Caroline Rutherford will go ahead on Sunday after the 10.30am High Mass, followed by a Lenten group in the Hughes Room, led by our Klingner Scholar, Xeverie Swee, and assisted by Alae Taule'alo and Carol O'Connor. On this coming Tuesday at 12 noon, we will launch the Lenten *Lectio divina* group in the church, and our two weekday online groups continue throughout Lent: Rosary, Monday to Friday at 5pm; and Meditation, Wednesday at 12 noon. Daily Mass also continues: this Saturday at 1:00pm for our monthly Cell of Our Lady of Walsingham Mass, and Monday to Friday at 7.15am. I do encourage you to take up one or more of these devotional and study opportunities, as part of your Lenten discipline.

LECTIO DIVINA - TUESDAYS AT 12 NOON THROUGHOUT LENT

As part of St Peter's Lenten offerings, Lectio Divina will be available on Tuesdays at 12 midday throughout Lent, both in the church and via Zoom. Lectio Divina (literally divine or sacred reading) is an ancient practice of reading and praying the Scriptures by listening with the "ear of the heart" for the gentle stirrings of the Spirit, and for a lifegiving or life-transforming word God is offering us for our life today.



Abbess Christine Valters Paintner, author of Lectio Divina: The Sacred Art, describes Lectio Divina as

"being present to each moment in a heart-centred way. When we pray *Lectio* we see sacred text as God's living words being spoken to our hearts in the moment. The practice allows us to encounter God in an active and intimate way. The invitation of *Lectio Divina*, therefore, is to cultivate a heart-centred intimacy with the sacred texts ... *Lectio* asks us to listen, savour and respond – not simply understand their meaning."

Fr Hugh, Fr Greg, Xeverie Swee and Roland Ashby formed the core of St Peter's Lectio Divina group during Advent, and warmly invite St Peter's parishioners to join them throughout Lent, either in the church or via Zoom. A RETIRED vicar and pioneer of the ordination of women, a former chairman of the appeal to restore St Paul's Cathedral and the immediate past Headmaster of Melbourne Grammar School are among Anglicans recognised in the Australia Day Honours List. The Revd Dr Colleen O'Reilly, who

was Vicar of St George's Malvern for 12 years until reaching the mandatory retirement age in 2019, was appointed a for the Ordination of Women - a spin-off of an English organisation – with Dr O'Reilly a co-founder with the late Dr Patricia Brennan."

Churches brace for new normal as holidays end

OST CHURCHES WITHIN THE Diocese of Melbourne have reopened, although many may struggle to fit in their congregation when holidays finish, Bishop Paul Barker has told TMA.

Bishop Barker, who oversees the

Jumbunna episcopate in Melbourne's south-east, said clergy were exhausted after the demands of 2020 and that the financial pressures on parishes would increase once JobKeeper finished in March.

Churches reopening Bishop Barker said that despite the Black Rock COVID outbreak in early January, 80 per cent or more of Anglican churches remained open.

"There are a couple that haven't yet reopened. I'm not aware of any of them, because of the scare, closing again but I had a couple of churches approach me on that issue.

"We're expecting bigger financial pressures in our parishes over the next six months because JobKeeper runs out at the end of March."

However, bigger churches faced problems "In half the churches, either the building's (too) small or they're the bigger churches for attendance – there is still the pressure of

fitting in."

Most churches that did livestreaming in lockdown are trying to do something similar now that physical church has resumed, Bishop Barker said. However, "doing the hybrid thing is hard work because you're catering for two different audiences at the same time.

JobKeep

Financially, annual reports indicated that JobKeeper had more than compensated in most parishes for the drop in congregational giving in 2020. However, parishes that relied on income from op shops or rents had suf fered, he said.

"We're expecting bigger financial pressures in our parishes over the next six months because JobKeeper runs out at the end of March and so we think that financial pres sures on churches will grow then."

Morale and fatigue Morale generally within the churches was "generally positive", Bishop Barker said although "when people are tired, it's hard to feel positive".

I think there's still an uncertainty for the future, so people are hoping for a better year this year. But people are still talking in terms

of what happens in winter with a third wave. Clergy, however, were fatigued by the demands of 2020 and the difficulty in taking leave during the year. "A lot of clergy are very tired and more than normal are taking parts

of January as holidays."
