

# Vicar's Musings

Lenten blessings as we embark on our inner and communal journey towards Holy Week and Easter. We had a series of very moving services on Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday, attended by more than 100 parishioners in all, as well as the now annual "Ashes to Go" outreach at Parliament Station. Thanks to everyone who was involved in making these various liturgies so meaningful. Below is a summary of the various St Peter's Lenten activities.

**Lenten Study Groups.** There are four groups this year. Register your interest through the Parish Office (ph. 9662 2391) or just turn up on the day.

- 1) "Going to the Supper of the Lord" from Sat. 29th February, at 10am
- These classes are for those from Children's Church preparing to receive First Communion or Confirmation. If your child would like to join, contact the Vicar.
- **2) Adult Confirmation, Baptism & Reception from Sun. 1st March, at 1:15pm** For adults seeking Confirmation, Baptism, or Reception; in the Vicarage. The topics we are exploring will include Fasting and Prayer, and The Sacraments.
- 3) Christian Meditation from Wed. 4th March, at 2.30pm

Roland Ashby will be leading a group on the Benedictine meditation practice of "Lectio divina". Held in the Lazarus (Handfield) Chapel (note change of venue).

4) EfM Film Study - Sundays 22nd & 29th March, 1pm

Fr Greg invites you to watch the film – "The Good Lie" – which tells the story of 3,600 "Lost Boys" orphaned by civil war in Sudan. Then Fr Greg will lead a theological reflection on the film. Held in the Hughes Room.

Lenten Meditation and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. Each week during Lent there will be a series of opportunities to deepen your prayer life and enter communally into the discipline of Contemplative Prayer.

Instead of giving up something for Lent this year, why not try the 40 days – 40 items challenge?



# Mass Readings

First Reading: Genesis 2.7-9, 16-18,2-5; 3.1-7

The Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being. And the Lord God planted a garden in Eden, in the east; and there he put the man whom he had formed. Out of the ground the Lord God made to grow every tree that is pleasant to the sight and good for food, the tree of life also in the midst of the garden, and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. And the Lord God commanded the man, "You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die." Then the Lord God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper as his patner.' And the man and his wife were both naked, and were not ashamed. Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden'?" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die." But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

#### **Second Reading:** Romans 5.12, 17-19

Just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, so death spread to all, because all have sinned. If, because of the trespass of one, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one, Jesus Christ. Therefore just as the trespass of one led to condemnation for all, so the act of righteousness of one leads to justification and life for all. For just as by the disobedience of one the many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one the many will be made righteous.

#### Gospel: Matthew 4.1-11

After being baptized, Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished. The tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." But he answered, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." Then the devil took him to the holy city and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down; for it is written, 'He will command his angels concerning you,'

and 'On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone." Jesus said to him, "Again it is written, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test." Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendour; and he said to him, "All these I will give you, if you will fall down and worship me." Jesus said to him, "Away with you, Satan! for it is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him." Then the devil left him, and suddenly angels came and waited on him.

#### **EfM LENTEN STUDY 2020**

The theme for the 2020 Exploring Faith Matters [formerly known as Education for Ministry] is Living Faithfully in a Multi-cultural World.

#### Synopsis:

They were known simply as "The Lost Boys".

Orphaned by the civil war in Sudan, which began in 1983, these young victims of civil war travelled as many as a thousand miles on foot in search of safety. Many years later a humanitarian effort would bring 3,600 lost boys, as well as girls, (all now young adults) to America.

The Good Lie tells the journey of a group of these children, their long and difficult trek from their village in southern Sudan, which had been destroyed in an attack by Northern militia, to Kakuma refugee camp in Kenya, and their resettlement 13 years later in America where they must learn how to live in a culture that is alien to them. It is a story of heartbreak and hope, a struggle for survival and ultimate triumph.

This movie challenges the centrality of the white Anglo Saxon cultural point of view. Although resettlement of this group of refugees is set in America, the experiences they face are a mirror of what their country men and women faced when offered refuge in Australia.

Everyone is invited to join us to see this film and to reflect upon it theologically and discern what implications it may have for our own faith journey and ministry this Lent and Easter.






#### **Recommended Lenten Reading**
