#### WELCOME TO ST PETER'S


Please read carefully and observe all the requisite COVID-Safe guidelines below:

# Weekly Reflections

A single person, by an action or their words, can help others to re-see the geographical and emotional landscape surrounding them. In the story of the Transfiguration, the disciples are taken away by Jesus to a remote place. They already know him and are prepared to lean in, listen to his teaching and follow his way. The Transfiguration, this great unveiling of God in Jesus, isn't about the witness of power and might of a superhero. Although suffused with a white light, there is no vision of white supremacy here. The revelation is an affirmation of the divinity and humanity of God's love. The long narrative of God's Love is galvanised into this one moment.

The hearts and minds of the disciples are blown away. Although the experience makes sense to them on one level, it also leaves them puzzled and questioning. They want to build three tents to memorialise this momentous revelation, but also know they need time to reflect on it. "Tell no-one," says Jesus, meaning, think about it. Not only that, but, most especially, live it. We can be tempted to think of the Transfiguration as a one-off, dramatic and life-changing event. But surely one of the messages in this story about Jesus is, as Desert Father Joseph said to Abba Lot, that we are each asked not only to say our prayers, keep our fasts and meditate, but also 'be transformed into fire.'

More often than not, in reality, those 'transformed into fire' are not the ones making the sweeping changes in the world. They are the persons going about their ordinary lives in the simplest of ways. Not perfect, but somehow at home in their skin and seemingly at one with circumstances around them. They are easy to be around. They possess a profound capacity to listen. What we most remember later, and it usually is later, is the way that they help us re-see our environment. This is not so much because of what they've done, but because of something they've allowed to shine through them. They may not have even seen it themselves, so aligned have they come to be in practising God's action through them. Our world seems a whole lot better. They shine peace.

Become an open signing bowl,' the contemporary English poet Malcolm Guite tells us. If we stay open, the heart of God is given space to move inside us. Just as the whole human experience of pain, hardship, injustice, suffering and power imbalance is reconfigured for those three disciples at the Transfiguration. A new courage, a new hope, a new way of understanding what the love of God means, can be born anew. In waking up to such reality, Malcolm Guite encourages, 'Stay with the music, words will come in time.'

#### LECTIO DIVINA - TUESDAYS AT 12 NOON THROUGHOUT LENT

As part of St Peter's Lenten offerings, Lectio Divina will be available on Tuesdays at 12 midday throughout Lent, both in the church and via Zoom. Lectio Divina (literally divine or sacred reading) is an ancient practice of reading and praying the Scriptures by listening with the "ear of the heart" for the gentle stirrings of the Spirit, and for a lifegiving or life-transforming word God is offering us for our life today.



Abbess Christine Valters Paintner, author of Lectio Divina: The Sacred Art, describes Lectio Divina as

"being present to each moment in a heart-centred way. When we pray *Lectio* we see sacred text as God's living words being spoken to our hearts in the moment. The practice allows us to encounter God in an active and intimate way. The invitation of *Lectio Divina*, therefore, is to cultivate a heart-centred intimacy with the sacred texts ... *Lectio* asks us to listen, savour and respond – not simply understand their meaning."

Fr Hugh, Fr Greg, Xeverie Swee and Roland Ashby formed the core of St Peter's Lectio Divina group during Advent, and warmly invite St Peter's parishioners to join them throughout Lent, either in the church or via Zoom. 

#### Retired vicar, former Melbourne Grammar leaders and barrister honoured

A RETIRED vicar and pioneer of the ordination of women, a former chairman of the appeal to restore St Paul's Cathedral and the immediate past Headmaster of Melbourne Grammar School are among Anglicans recognised in the Australia Day Honours List.

The Revd Dr Colleen O'Reilly, who was Vicar of St George's Malvern for 12 years until reaching the mandatory retirement age in 2019, was appointed a for the Ordination of Women - a spin-off of an English organisation – with Dr O'Reilly a co-founder with the late Dr Patricia Brennan."

# Churches brace for new normal as holidays end

OST CHURCHES WITHIN THE Diocese of Melbourne have reopened, although many may struggle to fit in their congregation when holidays finish,

Bishop Paul Barker has told TMA.

Bishop Barker, who oversees the Jumbunna episcopate in Melbourne's south-east, said clergy were exhausted after the demands of 2020 and that the financial pressures on parishes would increase once JobKeeper finished in March.

Churches reopening Bishop Barker said that despite the Black Rock COVID outbreak in early January, 80 per cent or more of Anglican churches remained open.

"There are a couple that haven't yet reopened. I'm not aware of any of them, because of the scare, closing again but I had a couple of churches approach me on that issue.

"We're expecting bigger financial pressures in our parishes over the next six months because JobKeeper runs out at the end of March."

However, bigger churches faced problems "In half the churches, either the building's (too) small or they're the bigger churches for attendance – there is still the pressure of

fitting in."

Most churches that did livestreaming in lockdown are trying to do something similar now that physical church has resumed, Bishop Barker said. However, "doing the hybrid thing is hard work because you're catering for two different audiences at the same time.

#### JobKeep

Financially, annual reports indicated that JobKeeper had more than compensated in most parishes for the drop in congregational giving in 2020. However, parishes that relied on income from op shops or rents had suf fered, he said.

"We're expecting bigger financial pressures in our parishes over the next six months because JobKeeper runs out at the end of March and so we think that financial pres sures on churches will grow then."

Morale and fatigue Morale generally within the churches was "generally positive", Bishop Barker said although "when people are tired, it's hard to feel positive".

I think there's still an uncertainty for the future, so people are hoping for a better year this year. But people are still talking in terms

of what happens in winter with a third wave. Clergy, however, were fatigued by the demands of 2020 and the difficulty in taking leave during the year. "A lot of clergy are very tired and more than normal are taking parts

of January as holidays."




#### THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD
