

WEEKLY MUSINGS

As Victorians retreat into our homes once again to face another bout of extended lockdown, I feel it is easier to do so compared to a year ago when we were raw to government-imposed solitary confinement. The great 17th-century French philosopher Blaise Pascal (1623-1662), one of my spiritual heroes, wrote about faith in a highly tumultuous time after the thirty years war where Europe had descended into brutality and chaos where Christians butchered each other over doctrinal differences. Despite the challenging and often uncertain times of violence, Pascal wrote of his unwavering belief in the Christian faith, he wrote that Christianity presented us with the finest study of human nature; why and how we behave the way we do and what can be done to remedy the human condition. Amongst many of his great writing is one of my favourites: "All of humanity's problems stem from man's inability to sit quietly in a room alone."

Pascal pointed out that human beings fear the silence of existence, we dread boredom and instead choose aimless distraction. Pascal coined the term "Deviation". Instead of dealing with the great question of does God exist? Who am I? Why am I here, heaven and hell, where am I going? The purpose of my life? All the great questions of life; we seek out "Deviations" to comfort our minds.

Yesterday, I saw two joggers jog pass the parish, as they jogged pass the corner of our street, they retracted their steps, turned around and shouted at the Wayside Crucifix: "The city is dead God, is this your will!" They are clearly frustrated and so are many Victorians. A study in the USA revealed that most people dislike being in a room alone for more than fifteen minutes. Some would rather give themselves a mild electric shock than to sit alone and practise holding the presence. My unasked question to the two joggers: "Is frustration your only reaction at this time?" Or perhaps we could use this Covid imposed über monasticism to sit quietly in our home and ponder the deeper Pascalian questions? Or perhaps to reach out and wrestle with God like Jacob did in the Bible and receive a new identity when we emerge from this Lockdown?

MASS SETTING: Service for the Office of Holy Communion, E.C. Bairstow (1874-1946)

The sacred ministers process to the altar steps; the celebrant then censes the altar.

INTROIT

Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I have called out to you all the day; for you, O Lord, are good and forgiving and plenteous in mercy to all who call upon you. Vs. Incline your ear, O Lord, and hear me, for I am needy and poor. Glory be etc.

Celebrant:

In the name of the Father, + and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.** The Lord be with you. **And also with you.**

The celebrant chants the collect for purity.

The cantor sings:

Lord have mercy, **Lord have mercy**, Lord have mercy Christ have mercy, **Christ have mercy**, Christ have mercy Lord have mercy, **Lord have mercy**, Lord have mercy

The celebrant introduces the confession:

Merciful God: Our maker and our judge, we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, and in what we have failed to do: we have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves; we repent and are sorry for all our sins. Father, forgive us. Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life; Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The celebrant pronounces the absolution.

The Gloria.

Glory be to God on high, and in earth peace, goodwill towards men. We praise thee, we bless thee, we worship thee, we glorify thee, we give thanks to thee for thy great glory, O Lord God, heavenly King, God the Father almighty. O Lord, the only-begotten Son Jesu Christ: O Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us. Thou that takest away the sins of the world, receive our prayer. Thou that sittest at

the right hand of God the Father, have mercy upon us. For thou only art holy; thou only art the Lord; thou only, O Christ, with the Holy Ghost, art most high in the + glory of God the Father. Amen.

The celebrant chants the collect of the day. Please then be seated for the readings.

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD


Deuteronomy 4.1-2, 6-8 read by Eugene Chin



THE GOSPEL

Celebrant:

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark (7.1-8, 14-15, 21-23)

+ Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

When the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around Jesus, they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles. So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, "Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?"

Jesus said to them, "Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written, "This people honours me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines.' You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition."

Then Jesus called the crowd again and said to them, "Listen to me, all of you, and understand: there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile. "For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. "All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person."


This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Glory be to thee, O Lord most High.



Four Suggested Titles to Read During Lockdown 6!


Dear parishioners and friends at St Peter's,

Are you looking for some more good Lockdown reading? Here are four titles the Bookroom recommends.

I am delighted to note that two of them are by Anglican clergy writers from Victoria: Duncan Reid and Graham Knott. Fellow Anglican priest, writer and Indigenous painter, Glenn Loughrey describes Duncan Reid's work Time We Started Listening (\$24.95) as

possessing that urgently needed capacity to see through the eyes of the other - to be in that place of intersection between Aboriginality and the European way of seeing.

Graham Knott's 101 Seasonal Reflections for Spiritual Growth (\$22-) offers stories and reflections that can be equally shared online or enjoyed alone in quiet times of contemplation. Paula Gooder's book Body (\$29.95) has been out since 2016 but still provides a relevant and necessary critique on the Apostle Paul's theology of the body. Scholarly crafted, pastorally sensitive and eloquently written. Finally, Franciscan Friar and Catholic Priest, Richard Rohr's book The Universal Christ (\$32.95) from 2019 reminds that in this world Christ is to be found in each person we meet



and that we are surrounded by the sacred. It's a work not based on theological technical thinking, but one more drawing the reader to grow in spiritual insight and wonder into the nature of our Christian God.
