PARISH GIVING SUNDAY

St Peter's is in your Hands

In September each year we ask you to again think about helping the Parish financially. When we wrote last year, we were in lockdown too. We long for a return to our uplifting Mass in person, but our fellowship continues, bonding us as we look forward to worshipping together physically in a month or so.

The parish is still doing God's work of outreach through the Lazarus Centre and the Social Enterprise. Our worship continues every day, even if on-line, and we still have expenses to keeping us going, keeping our music alive, and keeping us in touch with each other. The maintenance costs of the parish continue unabated as we clean the hall more thoroughly now than ever before.

Our financial situation has deteriorated further since we wrote to you about giving last year. We have had to sell shares to fund urgent repairs and our offertory plate hasn't kept pace. Every share we sell means a lower dividend in the future making our financial situation worse for future parishioners.

We ask you to continue to be an instrument of God's grace. Please continue your generosity to keep the parish going, supporting each other and supporting the wider world. Your contributions help the parish budget so that we can continue our ministries - our music, our liturgy, our bookshop, our work with RMIT, our work with the homeless and up skilling people into work, and our teaching ministries.

All these things cost money. All rely on your regular commitments and generous giving. There are many ways of supporting the work of the parish; please continue to do so and, in this time of additional costs and reduced revenues, please increase your commitment if you can.

Your consideration of financial support to keep our beautiful church functional during these extraordinarily difficult times is deeply appreciated.

The celebrant pronounces the absolution.


Numbers 11.16a,17c,25-29 read by Eugene Chin.







WEEKLY MUSINGS

Sequoia Trees can live up to 3500 years, grow taller than 300 feet and 36 metres wide. Due to unusually dry conditions, over the past year wildfires have burned millions of acres across California and Western United States, destroying hundreds of them. This year, park officials in California National Park have started swaddling the oldest and most ancient of these giant trees in a flame-resistant foil at their base in an effort to protect them after wildfires, ignited by lightening, have started spreading towards them.

What is it that we choose to protect? What do we value or would even stake our life on to preserve? So many of the prickly, angular statements and questions asked by Jesus in the Gospel of Mark are about honouring something that needs to be cherished. This something is real but elusive in terms of articulation: "I have come to call not the righteous but sinners" (2:17); "The sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the sabbath" (2:27); to mention just two. His phrases are puzzles for our mind. So often, Jesus seems to view the world from a different lens than those around him. Again and again, he is prepared to confront the distortion and manipulation of truth he perceives; even prepared to change his own mind when a truer picture of what's going on is presented to him by the Syrophoenician woman who confronts him about her own plight. Together they open a new doorway into the future of building God's kingdom on earth. This morning we are presented with yet another series of passionate, uncomfortable declarations of truth from Jesus: "it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell"; "if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out".

But it's right there - what Jesus cherishes. Impossible to pin down, "whoever is not against us is for us" but in every act born out of his name, "whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward." Compassion, offering refreshment. Being amongst and with those who are lost, lonely, in pain. In person, in prayer, in thought, in action. In pandemic time, now. And after. And building life in God from this place together. Our Anglo-Catholic tradition, our prayer life, our music and the centrality of liturgy at St Peter's embodies the story, the passion, the emptiness, the fulfilment of Christ's life here on earth and beyond. How we move amongst ourselves, even in lockdown, is how we bear each other's sadness or joy, how welcoming we are to offer a cup of water to the stranger, really matters. Online or in person. It is of value because it takes us all a little closer on the road with Christ towards the kingdom of God. This is all worth, not only protecting in flame resistant foil, but cherishing with great joy and confidence.


LIVING HERITAGE GRANT

Apparently the most widely searched for Christian poem on Google is "Footprints in the Sand" by the American poet Carolyn Joyce Carty.

It is about a man who has a dream that he is walking along a beach with Jesus and sees scenes from his life in the sky. He sees his footprints in the sand behind him, two sets of prints, his own and Jesus'. He has travelled his life trusting in Jesus, but it troubles him that at the worst times in his life when he has really struggled, there is only one set of prints.

He asks Jesus why, at these times when he needed Jesus most, he had been alone. Jesus replies

"My son, my precious child, I love you and I would never leave you. During your times of trial and suffering, when you see only one set of footprints, it was then that I carried you."

This poem is so loved because it speaks to people of how in life there are times when we need to be carried by Jesus. Our own resources even our prayers can dry up.

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
