Celebrant:

In the name of the Father, + and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

The celebrant chants the collect for purity.

Let us pray.
Almighty God,
to whom all hearts are open,
all desires known,
and from whom no secrets are hidden:
cleanse the thoughts of our hearts
by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit,
that we may perfectly love you,
and worthily magnify your holy name,
through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The cantor sings:

Kyrie eleison, Christe eleison, Kyrie eleison. Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy.

The celebrant introduces the confession:

God shows great love for us In that while we were still sinners Christ died for us

Silence

Let us then confess our sins in penitence and faith.

Merciful God, our maker and our judge, we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, and in what we have failed to do:

we have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves; we repent and are sorry for all our sins.

Father, forgive us.

Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The celebrant pronounces the absolution:

Almighty God,
Who has promised forgiveness of sins
to all those who turn to him in faith:
+ pardon you and set you free from all your sins,
strengthen you in all goodness
and keep you in eternal life,
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Gloria (omitted during Lent, and sung for the first time on Maundy Thursday):

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father; Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us. You are seated: at the right hand of the Father receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One. You alone are the Lord. You alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ with the Holy Spirit, + in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The celebrant chants the Maundy Thursday collect.

Holy God, source of all love, on the night of his betraval Jesus gave his disciples a new commandment, to love one another as he loved them: write this commandment in our hearts and give us the will to serve others as he was the servant of all. who gave his life and died for us, yet is alive and regins with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

READING: Book of Exodus 12.1-8, 11-14

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbour in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. For I will pass

through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.



EPISTLE: First letter of Paul to the Corinthians 11.23-26

Beloved: I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL: John 13.1-15

The cantor leads the singing of the acclamation.



The celebrant: The Lord be with you. And also with you.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Glory to you + Lord Jesus Christ.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came

to Simon Peter, who said to him, 'Lord, are you going to wash my feet?' Jesus answered, 'You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand.' Peter said to him, 'You will never wash my feet.' Jesus answered, 'Unless I wash you, you have no share with me.' Simon Peter said to him, 'Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!' Jesus said to him, 'One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you.' For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, 'Not all of you are clean.' After he had washed their feet, put on his robe, and returned to the table, Jesus said to them, 'Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord; and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Homily: Fr Hugh

After the homily the vicar washes the feet of the sacristan in a simple re-enactment of the events that took place in the Upper Room on Maundy Thursday.

The cantor sings Ubi Caritas in plainchant.

The prayers of the people.

Celebrant: Let us pray for the world and for the Church.

Almighty God, your Son Jesus Christ has promised

that you will hear us when we ask in faith:

receive the prayers we offer.

After each petition: Lord, in your mercy; hear our prayer.

And at the end: Rest eternal grant to them, O Lord,

and let light + perpetual shine upon them.

Celebrant: Almighty God, you have promised to hear our prayers.

Grant that what we have asked in faith

we may by your grace receive,

through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The greeting of peace.

We are the body of Christ.

His Spirit is with us.

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

And also with you.

The offertory hymn:

Celebrant:

Pray, my sisters and brothers, that our sacrifice may be acceptable to God, the Almighty Father.

May the Lord accept this sacrifice at your hands to the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his Church.

The Lord be with you. And also with you. Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord. Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The celebrant continues the prayer, leading to:

We proclaim your great and glorious name, forever praising you and singing:

Sanctus, Sanctus, Sanctus Holy, holy, holy

Dominus Deus Sabaoth. God of power and might, Pleni sunt caeli et terra heaven and earth are full

gloria tua. of your glory.

Hosanna in excelsis. Hosanna in the highest.

+ Benedictus qui venit + Blessèd is he who comes in nomine domini. in the name of the Lord Hosanna in excelsis Hosanna in the highest.

The celebrant continues the prayer, leading to: Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:




The celebrant continues the prayer, ending with:

We worship you, Father, in songs of never-ending praise.



As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray,



For the king - dom, the power, and the glo - ry are yours now and for e - ver. A - men

Celebrant: We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

We who are many are one body, **for we all share in the one bread.** *The cantor sings:*

Agnus Dei, Lamb of God,
qui tollis peccata mundi: you take away the sin of the world:
miserere nobis. have mercy on us.
Agnus Dei, Lamb of God,
qui tollis peccata mundi: you take away the sin of the world:
dona nobis pacem. grant us your peace.

Celebrant: Behold the Lamb of God,

who takes away the sins of the world.

Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you,

but only say the word and I shall be healed.

The sacrament is shared. Motet: William Byrd (c.1539/40-1623) Ave verum Corpus. At the conclusion of communion there is a time of silent prayer. The celebrant then prays:

Holy God, source of all love, on this night of betrayal Jesus commanded his disciples to love one another As he loved them. We thank you for feeding us in this supper. Give us the will to serve others, as our Lord was servant of all.

THE PROCESSION AND STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

Our usual Maundy Thursday procession and decoration of the Altar of Repose are much pared back this year. In a simple solemn procession, the celebrant removes the Blessed Sacrament from the Handfield Chapel altar, and places the ciborium in the Shrine of St Peter (the Old Baptistry). The cantor leads the singing of the hymn:

1. Of the glorious Body telling, O my tongue, its mysteries sing, And the Blood, all price excelling, Which the world's eternal King, In a spotless womb once dwelling, Shed for this world's ransoming.

- 2. At the last great supper lying Circled by his chosen band, Duly with the law complying, First he finished its command, Then, immortal food supplying, Gave himself with his own hand.
- 3. Therefore we, before him bending, This great sacrament revere; Types and shadows have their ending, For the newer rite is here; Faith, our outward sense befriending, Makes the inward vision clear.

The altar in the Handfield chapel is then stripped of all ornament and the altar-stone washed, while the cantor chants Psalm 22. Finally, the Vicar and others will keep a Watch of Prayer, in silence, at the Altar of Repose (the Shrine of St Peter) in preparation for the Good Friday liturgy tomorrow morning.
