

WELCOME TO ST PETER'S


Please read carefully and observe all the requisite COVID-Safe guidelines below:

- If you are feeling unwell, especially with COVID-19-type symptoms, you must not be at church; please go home now and get tested.
- Masks are no longer mandatory, but you are encouraged to wear them if you can't socially distance, and also when you sing.
- Our current density quotient at St Peter's allows for up to 110 people in the pews, and a total congregation (including choir, servers, children's church, overflow etc) of up to 174 people.
- If you have booked a pew, a sidesperson will tick off your name on arrival.
- If you have not booked, please scan the QR Code on your smart phone, or ask someone to do so for you.
- The new 2sqm spatial distancing essentially means keeping an elbow's distance from others at all times (other than partners and immediate family members).
- Please continue to sanitise your hands as you enter or leave church.
- Communion will continue in one kind only, with no common cup.
- Ideally, you should not shake hands, hug, or kiss others beyond your partner or immediate family.
- All service booklets are single use only, so please take yours home.

Please note: we have a busy programme of worship and social service at St Peter's Eastern Hill, seven days a week, but the church and hall are cleaned and sanitised daily, under WorkSafe pandemic guidelines, so you can be assured of the cleanliness of our buildings and furnishings.

Please do not genuflect until the Eucharistic Prayer, as the Tabernacle is traditionally empty for the start of this Mass. The people's responses are printed in **bold**. Please stand at the start of Mass.

The deacon introduces the confession:

Father, forgive us. Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life; Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The celebrant pronounces the absolution. Please then stand for the Gloria:

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

EXODUS 12.1-8, 11-14 read by Anne Scott-Pendlebury

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbour in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the Passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance. Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Deacon:

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John (13.1-15)

+ Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, 'Lord, are you going to wash my feet?' Jesus answered, 'You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand.' Peter said to him, 'You will never wash my feet.' Jesus answered, 'Unless I wash you, you have no share with me.' Simon Peter said to him, 'Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!' Jesus said to him, 'One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you.' For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, 'Not all of you are clean.' After he had washed their feet, put on his robe, and returned to the table, Jesus said to them, 'Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord; and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Homily: Mthr Pirrial Clift

After the homily follows the washing of the feet. Twelve people are invited forward to enact the events in the Upper Room on Maundy Thursday. A cantor sings the antiphons of the day.

The Lord Jesus, when he had eaten with his disciples, poured water into a basin: and began to wash their feet saying: this example I leave you.

Great is the Lord and greatly to be praised: in the city of our God. A.

Lord, why do you wash my feet? Jesus said to him: if I do not wash your feet, you can have no part with me.

So he came to Simon Peter, who said to him. A.

Now, you do not know what you are doing, but later you will understand. A.

Antiphon III.

If I your Lord and Teacher have washed your feet, then surely you must wash one another's feet.

Oh hear this, all you peoples: give ear all you inhabitants of the world. A.

Antiphon IV

If there is love among you, all will know that you are my disciples. Jesus said to his disciples. A.

Antiphon V

I give you a new commandment: love one another as I have loved you, says the Lord.

Blessed are those whose way is blameless: who walk in the law of the Lord. A.

Antiphon VI

Faith, hope and love, let these endure among you; and the greatest of these is

Now there are found faith, hope and love, these three: and the greatest of these is love. A.




