



A reading from the letter of Paul to the Philippians.

[...] I, too, have reason for confidence in the flesh.

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

⁷Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, ¹¹if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

¹²Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

has become the cornerstone;

this was the Lord's doing,

and it is amazing in our eyes"?

⁴³Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. ⁴⁴The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls.'

⁴⁵ When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. ⁴⁶They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.



Weekly Reflections

Pew Sheet Reflection for Sunday October 8th, 2023

Written on the Memorial of St Francis of Assisi...

Late last year, when I was contemplating moving flats for the fourth time in three years, I concluded that I needed a rug: a big red rug that I could unfurl and, wherever I was, I would be *home*. My father managed to find an intensely verdant one from Qom, Iran, that belonged to the one family for seventy years before an auction house bought it from them. (So the auction house proclaimed, and so we are happy to believe...) On hearing reports of my magnificent new 'home', my aunt promptly emailed from Scotland to inform us that you could even *sleep* on such a rug and be insulated against the cold of the floor.

St Francis of Assisi is well-known for his life of poverty, dramatically renouncing all he possessed or could ever hope to inherit in order to devote himself whole-heartedly to the Christ of the Crib and of the Holy Cross. Infamously, he took off the clothes he was wearing and left them at the feet of his father (a cloth merchant), before the bishop of Assisi embraced and clothed him.

The first thing Francis did after this stormy act of renunciation was move into the crumbling chapel of San Damiano and rebuild it, out of reverence for the Lord who abided within. He moved on from there to the Church of St Mary of the Angels, where he was known to spend hours by night in prayer, with his companions, before the Altar in the presence of his Lord. From that communion he seems to have drawn the spiritual joy for which he was so famous.

Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head. In a sense, neither did St Francis; yet whether or not he knew where he would lay his head that night, he could usually find his way to a place where he would be in the presence of Christ. During his lifetime the practice of reserving the Sacrament in Tabernacles in churches and wayside chapels was becoming increasingly common. On entering a church St Francis would have his companions kneel with him before the tabernacle, and he taught them to proclaim:

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you, in this church and in churches throughout the world: because by your holy cross, you have redeemed the world.

Francis often speaks of the Sacrifice and the Sacrament of Jesus in a single breath, if only implicitly. In his letter to the General Chapter of his order in 1224, he entreats them, in his characteristically passionate manner, to 'show the greatest possible reverence and honour for the most holy body and blood of our Lord Jesus

Christ through whom *all things, whether on the earth or in the heavens*, have been brought to peace and reconciled with Almighty God.'


