GATHERING IN GOD'S NAME

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions, only congregations of up to 20 people are permitted to attend public worship, in addition to those officiating at the Mass. Our Archbishop has also advised that services should be led by an organist and cantor only, rather than a choir, and that we should keep conregational hymn singing to a minimum. So, our worship has certainly not yet returned to the way it was. If you can't come to Mass in person, we warmly invite you to join us online each Sunday. Today's Mass will be live-streamed on our FaceBook page, and the following day uploaded to YouTube (https://bit.ly/3aEZVuB).

Celebrant: In the name of the Father, + and of the Son

and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The celebrant chants the collect for purity.

Let us pray: Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name, through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The cantor sings: Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy.

The celebrant introduces the confession:

Let us confess our sins in penitence and faith, confident in God's forgiveness.

we have sinned against you
in thought, word, and deed,
and in what we have failed to do:
we have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves;
we repent and are sorry for all our sins.

through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The celebrant pronounces the absolution:

Almighty God,
Who has promised forgiveness of sins
to all those who turn to him in faith:
+ pardon you and set you free from all your sins,
strengthen you in all goodness
and keep you in eternal life,

through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Gloria.

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will.

THE FIRST READING: Jeremiah 20.7, 10-13



Please observe spatial distancing of 1.5m at all times, approaching the altar rail via the centre aisle and returning via the side aisles.

SUNDAY AND WEEKDAY MASSES – ATTENDING IN PERSON

The West Door of the church is once again open to the public, for congregations of up to 20 people. But our worship is by no means back to the way it was before the pandemic. Many parishioners are choosing to remain at home, and join the Mass by YouTube or on FaceBook. If you would like to come back to church, however, you are welcome to join Fr Philip, Fr Greg, Fr Ken and Fr Hugh in person for one or more of the following Masses:

- Monday Friday 7.15am
- Wednesday 1.15pm
- Saturday 9.00am
- Sunday 10.30am (the "book a pew" service)

Now that we can have 20 people at Mass (and probably extended to 50 next Sunday) the weekday services have plenty of capacity. But sadly, you cannot just turn up like you used to on a Sunday, because of the limited numbers allowed to attend public worship. So, you need to "book a pew" for each Sunday Mass at this stage. Booking your pew is a very simple procedure, but you must plan ahead, or you may risk being turned away from church (something none of us would want to happen).

Very important: you must "book a pew" at least 48 hours (2 days) in advance of any service you would like to attend.
