

Vicar's Musings

COVID SAFE OFFICER (CSO)

At its May 2020 meeting the Parish Council appointed Rachel Ellyard, Parish Warden, as the St Peter's COVID Safe Officer.

DECISION MAKING

Over May and June the Vicar, Wardens, CSO, Parish Council, Church Staff, Volunteer Leaders, tenants and non-church groups have discussed and implemented the various DHHS and Diocesan guidelines for places of worship, community facilities, and retail facilities, including most recently: Stay Safe Directions (bit.ly/3fAeou7) Restricted Activity Directions no. 9 (bit.ly/30Vx43j) and the Diocesan COVID Safe Checklist (bit.ly/2Yf1YlC). There is agreement that all Parish activities are compliant according to the State and Diocesan guidelines.

VULNERABLE PERSONS

The communications strategy to minimise risk to vulnerable persons in the community has been as follows, and will be ongoing:

- The Vicar's regular newsletters "Back to St Peter's: Small Steps" have been cautious in encouraging parishioners back to church, often quoting the Archbishop's advice: "in general people ought to remain at home."
- Those who are feeling uncomfortable returning to church, due to underlying health conditions or any other reasons, are affirmed in their decision to stay at home.
- Those who are sick, especially with flu-like symptoms, must stay at home, consult their GP, and get tested.
- Parishioners have been encouraged to continue to engage with St Peter's Online Ministries even after restrictions were eased (daily Mass, Sunday Mass, Zoom Morning Tea, Praying the Rosary, Christian Meditation, EFM Classes etc)
- A Telephone Tree has been established, where 22 parishioners and staff have made phone contact with all 161 people on the parish roll.

SIGNAGE, RECORDS REQUIREMENTS AND COMMUNICATIONS

St Peter's is compliant with Section 15 of the Restricted Activity Directions (no. 9) (bit.ly/30Vx43j). This currently restricts a congregation at pubic worship to 20 people, in addition to those required to lead and administer worship. Signage at the entrance to church, handouts, and verbal communication from the sidespeople makes this restriction very clear to everyone attending public worship.

The Parish Administrator keeps records for 28 days of the first name and phone number of all people who are in church or the other buildings for more than 15 minutes:

- Those attending weekday and Sunday Mass, both parishioners and visitors
- Church groups and meetings
- Lazarus Centre Staff and volunteers
- Coffee Caravan staff and volunteers
- Meals Program volunteers
- Hall tenants and any other group meetings

COVID Safe posters are on display at the church entrance, in the toilets, the hall, the kitchens and elsewhere.

As numbers at worship have increased, from 10 to 20, an announcement has been made at every service so that those returning to church are reminded to: maintain spatial distancing, use hand sanitiser, not shake hands, and for 'symptomatic' persons (or close contacts) to self-exclude. Fliers containing this information are also handed out at worship by the sidespeople.

CLEANING

The cleaning of the church and other facilities is undertaken daily by commercial cleaners according to DHHS RADs (bit.ly/30Vx43j) and Safe Work Australia (bit.ly/2Yckwmr) cleaning requirements.

Hand sanitiser is placed at the entry and exit points of church, toilets, parish hall, kitchens and Bookroom.

Service and meeting times allow at least one full hour for cleaning between Masses and any other church or hall bookings.

SPATIAL DISTANCING

In church, for all Masses, congregants and officiants are allowed to sit or stand no closer than 1.5m from others. Parishioners are literally asked to "Book a Pew" at least 48 hours in advance of the Sunday service. On arrival in church, parishioners are instructed by the sidespeople to sit one person (or family group) per pew, and to leave at least one empty pew in front and behind, which ensures 1.5m spacing. Priests and servers, the organist and cantor, also observe strict spatial distancing at all times. At the end of Mass the priest and sidespeople ensure that spatial distancing continues to be observed by congregants as long as they are on the church site. To date we have not resumed refreshments after Mass.

All other groups on site, church and other, have submitted COVID Safe protocols for their activities, including spatial distancing measures.

The density quotient for each section of the church and hall is as follows:

CHURCH

- Sanctuary 5x10 = d.q.12.5 (12 people max)
- Nave 10x22 = d.q.55 (55 max)
- Choir Gallery (North & South) 3.4x4.8=d.q 4.08 (4 max each) + Organist
- Sacristy $4.8x3 = d.q \ 3.6 \ (3 \ max)$
- Cookhouse 2x2.5 = d.q1.25 (1 max)
- Handfield Chapel 7x3.2 = d.q. 5.6 (5 max)
- Lady Chapel $3.5 \times 2.9 = d.q. 2.54 (2 max)$

HALL

- Main space 22x9 = d.q.49.5 (49 people max)
- Main kitchen 4.2x3.2 = d.q.3.36 (3 max)
- Hughes Rm 7.8x5.8 = d.q.11.31 (11 max)
- Maynard kitchen & storeroom 4.1x2.5 = d.q.2.56 (2 max)

PARISH OFFICE

• 2x7 = d.q. 3.50 (3 people max)

BOOKROOM

• 7.8x4.0 = d.q. 31.2 (7 people max)

WORSHIP

Single-use service sheets are now used for all services (no hymnbooks etc). Services avoid prolonged face to face contact. Every service has an assigned person to record names and phone numbers of attendees, who will turn people away if the maximum permitted number of people is reached. The celebrant sanitises his or her hands before the Mass, and prior to the preparation of the altar. Administration of communion is in one kind (the host only). Vestments and robes are not shared between clergy, servers or lay ministers.

PRIVATE PRAYER IN CHURCH

The church doors are locked between services and scheduled meetings. Private prayer in church must be booked. The Vicar or Administrator is then responsible for letting individuals or small groups into church, and ensuring that DHHS RADs are followed at all times.

OTHER GROUPS

The Vicar and/or Parish Administrator, under the guidance of the CSO, has discussed and has an agreement with all groups (church or otherwise) using church premises for maintaining DHHS RADs and including proper cleaning.

INCIDENTS

If any parishioner, staff member, or person on site at St Peter's is known to have contracted COVID-19, or been in contact with a person who has the virus, this information must be communicated urgently with the Vicar and/ or Administrator (or a priest-in-charge). The CSO will then be informed immediately.

It is then the responsibility of the CSO to promptly:

- Report the incident to the bishop
- Close the premises
- Follow the measures as indicated by Safe Work Australia (bit.ly/2Yckwmr)

Sunday Mass Readings

First Reading: Jeremiah 20.7, 10-13

Jeremiah cried out: "O Lord, you have enticed me, and I was enticed; you have overpowered me, and you have prevailed. I have become a laughingstock all day long; everyone mocks me. For I hear many whispering: 'Terror is all around! Denounce him! Let us denounce him!' All my close friends are watching for me to stumble. 'Perhaps he can be enticed, and we can prevail against him, and take our revenge on him.' But the Lord is with me like a dread warrior; therefore my persecutors will stumble, and they will not prevail. They will be greatly shamed, for they will not succeed. Their eternal dishonour will never be forgotten. O Lord of hosts, you test the righteous, you see the heart and the mind; let me see your retribution upon them, for to you I have committed my cause. Sing to the Lord; praise the Lord! For he has delivered the life of the needy from the hands of evildoers."

Second Reading: Romans 5.12-15

Just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, so death spread to all because all have sinned. Sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. Yet death exercised dominion from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sins were not like the transgression of Adam, who is a type of the one who was to come. But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many.

Gospel: Matthew 10.26-33

Jesus summoned the twelve and sent them out with the following instructions: "Have no fear; for nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered, and nothing secret that will not become known. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops. Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell. Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. And even the hairs of your head are all counted. So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows. Everyone therefore who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven; but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven."

MEDITATION @THE HILL TO RESUME ON TUESDAY EVENINGS AT 6PM

Christian meditation at St Peter's will resume on Tuesdays at 6pm starting on 23 June. So as to be able to observe social distancing requirements, the meditation will be in the body of the church, in front of the steps up to the sanctuary. Please bring your own rug. Parishioner Roland Ashby, who will be facilitating the meditation sessions, says that meditation is about "tapping into a deep spring of love, joy and peace at the centre of our being. Jesus called it 'living water'."

Attending Mass in Person

Unfortunately, during the Victorian Government staged restrictions easing, we still cannot resume the old pattern of Sunday worship; but the good news is, you can now come back to church!

From Monday 1st June, the number of congregants permitted at Mass increased to 20. All going well, from our Patronal Festival on Sunday 28th June, we will be allowed to have a congregation of 50 people. Some members of the congregation are not yet ready to return to church, which is certainly wise given that the pandemic is far from over. If you would like to come to church, however, you are welcome to attend one or more of the following services of Holy Communion each week:

- Tuesday 7.15am
- Wednesday 7.15am, 1.15pm
- Thursday 7.15am
- Friday 7.15am
- Saturday 9.00am
- Sunday 10.30am (the book-a-pew service)

Very important: on a Sunday you must "book a pew" at least 48 hours (2 days) in advance of any service you would like to attend. Please e-mail the Parish Office – sphoffice@stpeters.org.au (preferred), or, phone our Administrator Kosta on (03) 9662 2391 Make sure to leave your name and phone number, indicate which service, from the above list, you hope to attend, the date or dates of the service(s) you would like to attend. If the service is full, we will let you know, otherwise just come to church.

Annual Appeal

The St Peter's Eastern Hill Charitable Foundation is a key way in which our church supports the Lazarus Centre, which has been serving breakfast and providing support to Melbourne's homeless every day of the year for the past 28 years.

In the past 12 months, we have provided breakfast and support for more than 1,000 individuals. This has included more than 1,000 items of clothing, hundreds of swags and blankets and more than 2,500 shower vouchers.

In September 2019 the St Peter's Eastern Hill Social Enterprise was born, with the launch of "Heaven at The Hill" coffee caravan. Already they have employed two job seekers and provided volunteering opportunities for numerous others. Over the pandemic period the social enterprise has also built up a meals program in partnership with State Parliament and RMIT University.

Right now, we are holding our Annual Appeal and we urgently need your help to continue to do our work helping those in need.




