Vicar's Musings

"For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope."

Jeremiah 29:11

As Ray Charles famously sang in 1967: "Here we go again." Stage Three restrictions are back in town, and on Thursday morning the West Door of our church was once again closed to the public, as a small group of us live-streamed the 7.15am Mass. There is a sense of despair and frustration among the St Peter's staff and parishioners I have been in touch with since then, but also resignation that this is the path we must take here in Melbourne to get back on top of the most recent COVID-19 outbreak. At least one advantage, although unpleasant, is that we have all been here before and know the drill.

A couple of offerings from your Vicar, which I hope will assist you in the times that lie ahead. Firstly, a reminder of the online parish ministries that we have developed over recent months to help keep us connected as a church community:

- The Sunday 10.30am Mass will continue to be live-streamed onto FaceBook (bit.ly/2ZeiZN5) and for those who prefer YouTube, will be uploaded afterwards (bit.ly/2AIZiDF).
- I am enjoying the weekly after-Mass chats with parishioners, 12.30pm each Sunday, at "Morning Tea at the Vicarage" on Zoom. These will continue during the lock-down, so do drop in if you can (bit.ly/3fh0BZw).
- Although the doors are closed, our Bookroom is still trading on-line, so do drop in and order a book (bookroom.stpeters.org.au).
- Praying the Rosary, every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 5pm. If you would like to join our Lay Minister, Alae Taule-alo, for these devotions on Zoom send him an e-mail - <u>alaetaulealo@gmail.com</u>
- Christian Meditation, Wednesdays at 12 noon. Parishioner, and former editor of *The Melbourne Anglican*, Roland Ashby, leads 45 minutes of contemplative prayer each week on Jitsi (similar to Zoom). He would love to hear from you if you'd like to join randrashby@bigpond.com
- Fr Greg Davies is the National Director for EFM, a Christian Education program for lay people as well as clergy. We are blessed to have Fr Greg on the St Peter's team, so do e-mail him if you are interested in his theological conversation group, or various courses on offer through EFM

• The St Peter's Telephone Tree is now up and running, with twenty-two Parish Callers touching base with 161 of our parishioners and friends. We've had some very positive feedback about the Tree, but if you would like to call me as the Coordinator for any reason, don't hesitate; I'd love to hear from you.

Secondly, a word of hope. Despite all these on-line offerings, Church is certainly not what it used to be. There is no disputing that. Life changed so suddenly for us all on 22nd March, and now it feels like we are back to square one again. I must confess to have been feeling rather despondent myself over the past week. But as I was preparing my Musings this week, the words of Jeremiah 29:11 came to mind. I first meditated deeply on this verse as a young man, while travelling on my own around India. I had run out of money, was sick, and feeling a long way from home. They were words, a mantra in fact, that gifted me with a deep assurance of Christ's presence in the midst of challenge. God does indeed have a plan for each one of us, as well as a plan for our Church and our City. As we follow the Way, and take up our Cross, we can be assured that this is a path of ultimate wellbeing and hopefulness, even if we are currently experiencing profound questioning and suffering.

In closing, a prayer of hope for these times, written by Rabbi Naomi Levy:

We are frightened, God, worried for our loved ones, worried for our world.

Helpless and confused, we turn to you seeking comfort, faith and hope.

Teach us God, to turn our panic into patience, and our fear into acts of kindness.

Our strong must watch out for our weak; our young must take care of our old.

Help each one of us to do our part to halt the spread of this virus.

Send strength and courage to the doctors and nurses in the front lines,

Fortify them with the full force of their healing powers.

Send wisdom and insight to the scientists working to discover healing treatments.

Fill our leaders with the wisdom and the courage to choose wisely and act quickly.

May we see that we are one world, one people who will rise above this pandemic together.

Watch over us God, grace us with your love, bless us with your healing light.

Hear us God,

Heal us God.



Sunday Mass Readings

First Reading: Isaiah 55.10-11

"As the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it."

Psalm: 65.9abcd, 9e-10, 11-12, 13



You visit the earth and water it, you greatly enrich it; the river of God is full of water; you provide the people with grain. R. For so you have prepared the earth: you water its furrows abundantly, settling its ridges, softening it with showers, and blessing its growth. R. You crown the year with your bounty; your pathways overflow with richness. The pastures of the wilderness overflow, the hills gird themselves with joy. R. The meadows clothe themselves with flocks, the valleys deck themselves with grain, they shout and sing together for joy. R.

Second Reading: Romans 8.18-23

I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labour pains until now; and not only

the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

Gospel: Matthew 13.1-23

Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables. "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!" Then the disciples came and asked Jesus, "Why do you speak to them in parables?" He answered, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it has not been given. For to those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. The reason I speak to them in parables is that 'seeing they do not perceive, and hearing they do not listen, nor do they understand.' With them indeed is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah that says: 'You will indeed listen, but never understand, and you will indeed look, but never perceive. For this people's heart has grown dull, and their ears are hard of hearing, and they have shut their eyes; so that they might not look with their eyes, and listen with their ears, and understand with their heart and turn—and I would heal them.' But blessed are your eyes, for they see, and your ears, for they hear. Truly I tell you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see, but did not see it, and to hear what you hear, but did not hear it. Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

God Only: A 6 Day At Home Retreat With Evelyn Underhill (Sunday 26th July – Friday 1st August 2020)

Evelyn Underhill (1875 – 1941) is best known today for her writing on mysticism and prayer. As an Anglican, worship and the sacraments were fundamental to her faith. Abp Michael Ramsey later said it was Evelyn Underhill who kept the church going during the period between the wars.

Each day on this retreat we shall learn a little about her life, as well as read and reflect on a piece of writing from one of her books. There will be some questions, short biblical passage and a prayer. The retreat is designed to accommodate those of us who lead busy lives as well those at home during this time. It is time flexible; retreatants can devote half a hour a day or more as they prefer.

ST PETER'S PRAYER LINK

AN INITIATIVE OF THE PASTORAL CARE TEAM

Our Pastoral Care Team has launched a new initiative this month: the St Peter's Prayer Link. We are inviting parishioners and others to submit prayer requests, which will trigger focused prayer support from a small group of pray-ers, for one month from the date of the request being made. Further prayer requests may be made, but the prayer focus does not automatically continue beyond a month. The St Peter's Prayer Link does not replace the weekly Prayer List that is published in the Pew Sheet, and used at Mass each day of the week. Rather, this is intended as a prayer boost, additional private prayer support for those who request it.

Prayers for the month may be requested for those who are sick, but also for particular situations or concerns that are weighing heavily on you. They say that a problem shared is a problem halved. Similarly, a prayer shared is a prayer multiplied.

Fr Roger Prowd is the St Peter's Prayer Link coordinator. The others in the Prayer Link at this inaugural stage are: Fr Hugh, Di Clark, Xeverie Swee, and Peter Yewers. We anticipate bringing one or two other members of the Pastoral Care team onto the Prayer Link in the coming weeks. Who these new members are will be communicated clearly in the weekly Pew Sheet.

Confidentiality is of course paramount to this model of prayer support, so be assured that prayer requests will be kept strictly private amongst the Prayer Link group. Prayer requests will not be made public at Mass, nor shown in the Pew Sheet.

To ensure effective, confidential and accurate communication, all prayer requests should be made to the coordinator, Fr Roger, only. Fr Roger will then pass the request to the others in the Prayer Link. If you would like additional confidentiality for your prayer request, just mention this to Fr Roger, and your petition will be circulated to the Prayer Link group anonymously. 
