Vicar's Musings

Today we celebrate our Dedication Festival, the anniversary of the "first service" conducted at St Peter's Eastern Hill on Sunday 6th August 1848, presided over by the newly installed Bishop of Melbourne, the Rt Rev'd Charles Perry. Was this early congregation able to look 172 years into the future, the church building might be largely recognisible, but the television-recording-studio nature of lock-down worship, with a physically present congregation of just 5 people, would be thoroughly bemusing. Even more so, perhaps, the fact that well over 100 people were joining the service of worship remotely from all over Melbourne, inter-state, and indeed as far away as Cambridge, Massachusetts, in the USA. I must say that even I am still having trouble getting used to that reality of Eucharistic worship in 2020.

I mentioned in last week's sermon an excellent paper, written by Bishop Bradley Billings, entitled "Spiritual Communion" (bit.ly/339roDN). He writes: "The celebration of, and participation in, the Sacrament of Holy Communion is an important part of Anglican worship, being described by the Articles of Religion (28) as 'a Sacrament of our Redemption by Christ's death.' Many Anglicans are feeling acutely the present inability for us to meet in places of worship and to share in the Sacrament of Holy Communion." Bishop Brad then reflects on the long-held Anglican doctrine of "Spiritual Communion" outlined in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer service for The Communion of the Sick: "if a person is unable to physically receive the sacrament of Holy Communion, and if that person 'truly repents' and 'steadfastly believes' that Jesus shed his blood for their redemption, that person 'doth eat and drink the Body and Blood of our Saviour Christ profitably,' even though not physically receiving the Sacrament. As well as providing solace for those who are ill, there is provision for Spiritual Communion in other circumstances, such as 'want of warning in due time to the Curate; for lack of company to receive with him; or by any other just impediment." Scattered across Melbourne, and further afield, due to the pandemic, if ever there was such just impediment, it is now.

The receiving of Spiritual Communion is of course very different from going to church, but it is well worth persevering with in these times. You may wish to create a small chapel space at home; with candles, an icon, a Bible and of course these days the obligatory computer, phone, smart TV, and/or i-pad.

You may like to print off the order of service from the St Peter's web site www.stpeters.org.au or if you have enough devices just follow it online while watching the Mass. Holy Communion at St Peter's is live-streamed each Sunday at 10.30am, on FaceBook and YouTube, or you may wish to watch it later at your leisure. When it comes to the time in the Mass to receive the Sacrament, you may find it helpful to pray this prayer:

Lord Jesus, I believe that you are present in the most Holy Sacrament.

I love you above all things, and I desire to receive you into my soul.

Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally,

Come at least spiritually into my heart.

I embrace you as if you were already there and unite myself wholly to you.

Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.

Holy Communion is a profound experience, connecting us as Christians to one another and to God. This week I have received three beautiful letters from parishioners expressing so lucidly their lived reality of Spiritual Communion in our current dispersion. I thought you might find it encouraging to read these uplifting and faith-filled "letters in exile" from New South Wales to Hawthorn Victoria, and even as far as Cambridge Massachusetts in the USA.

Firstly a message from a new parishioner, living in Sydney, who has joined our weekday Mass congregation since the start of the pandemic:

My name is Vicky, and I was made redundant back in March; feeling a little lost I stumbled upon the Daily Mass. I fell in love with this church when I visited Melbourne a couple of winters ago. I donated a jacket and met the wonderful ladies in the book store. I cannot explain how much joy I receive whilst enjoying the service. Fr Hugh is a wonderful soul and his kind words are very soothing and he checks up on me from time to time to see how I am. I really feel that I am part of St Peter's Eastern Hill Church and I am so glad it is online to enjoy anytime during the day or whenever I feel down and need some uplifting words of wisdom. I hope it continues after the Covid-19 virus is gone and I cannot wait to come and participate in a morning service. Thankyou to Fr Hugh and everyone who is involved, the difference you have made in my life is priceless.

An e-mail from familiar friends and parishioners nearer to home:

In March we had to bow out of the comfort and consolation we were glad to receive weekly at St Peter's. The imposition of the Lockdown' compelled us to stay at home and prepare for a sense of loss. Imagine our delight therefore when our Vicar and his leadership team decided to conduct our weekly Mass by broadcast means: the wonders of the modern means of communication by IT meant that we were able to be present at Mass at a distance and be attuned to its message while being at home. We could switch on to "YouTube" at the appointed time and respond to our screen as the repository of all that we missed and needed from our church. The sight of the Sanctuary — its flowers, candles, hangings and reredos — awakened in us a sense of expectation each week, an expectation

that was enhanced by hearing the bell and seeing the entry of the Clergy — celebrant and acolytes — in their beautiful vestments, appropriate to the season. We became willing participants in the beauty of the liturgy, music and communion, taking a part in all elements of the Mass. Our response to the communions you have conducted since that time has been a source of uplift and inspiration to us throughout these difficult times ... They make our access to worship an important part of our lives. We have been very grateful to our friend and fellow parishioner Dr Kelly Shang, who set up our access to YouTube and gave us the on-line skills that enabled us to access the services at St Peter's. We have also recommended the services at St Peter's to our friends, who have accessed them through YouTube, whether it be in country Victoria, New South Wales, or the UK. They have been deeply touched by the beauty of holiness that characterizes services at St Peter's. We look forward to the time when we can all be together in person but in the meantime we give thanks for the blessings bestowed upon us by you and all the members of the Sanctuary team and choir who have made this experience of worship so meaningful to us during this time of isolation and shutdown. With love, praise and blessings, David and Judith.

And finally, from our friends and St Peterites in the USA:

Dear Father Hugh, it's so good to hear from you in these strange times. We've heard about Melbourne's recent return to lockdown and are thinking of you and missing everyone at the Hill. We're in Cambridge, just outside of Boston, and busily preparing for a new academic year at Harvard that will start in a few weeks with only a small percentage of students on campus. We wanted to share the following thoughts about St Peter's — feel free to share whatever from this you like. When our family moved back to the U.S. in mid-2019, we left a piece of our heart at St Peter's. It was very meaningful for Meg, who returned to Melbourne for a short work trip this past January, to sing with the choir for two Sundays and to bring a few dear colleagues along to Mass. We had also hoped to return for a family trip this year, which of course won't happen. It's difficult not to know when we might be able to be at the Hill again. That's what has made staying in touch with St Peter's online so special for us. We remember watching one of the first virtual Masses, in the early days of our stayat-home order in Massachusetts, on a Saturday night, our time. We were so thrilled to hear Rachel Ellyard's voice, since she was cantor that day, and to chat along on the choir Facebook group with other choristers. Our son Charlie must have sensed something important was going on, and he came out of his bedroom to listen with us before cuddling down to fall back asleep. Every Sunday morning, we wish we were at St Peter's, and Meg often texts Sue Wuttke at that time to check in. We also love the choir Facebook group. We all look forward to the Virtual Chant Choir offerings that Katie Richardson posts. We particularly loved the Easter sing that Eliza Kelly posted; that was a day we really missed St Peter's. Most special of all was the virtual choir rendition of Orlando Gibbons's Drop, Drop, Slow Tears that the Virtual Chant Choir sent us on April 16, the anniversary of our daughter Dorothy Sarah's birth and death. With friends like you all, it's impossible to feel alone. It means so much for us to be able to continue to share in the St Peter's community. While we long for the day when we can be together in person, we are grateful for all the ways we can stay connected, even when half a world apart. Warmly, Chip and Meg.

When he went ashore, Jesus saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." And he said, "Bring them here to me." Then Jesus ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

ST PETER'S PRAYER LINK

AN INITIATIVE OF THE PASTORAL CARE TEAM

Our Pastoral Care Team has launched a new initiative this month: the St Peter's Prayer Link. We are inviting parishioners and others to submit prayer requests, which will trigger focused prayer support from a small group of pray-ers, for one month from the date of the request being made. Further prayer requests may be made, but the prayer focus does not automatically continue beyond a month. The St Peter's Prayer Link does not replace the weekly Prayer List that is published in the Pew Sheet, and used at Mass each day of the week. Rather, this is intended as a prayer boost, additional private prayer support for those who request it.

Prayers for the month may be requested for those who are sick, but also for particular situations or concerns that are weighing heavily on you. They say that a problem shared is a problem halved. Similarly, a prayer shared is a prayer multiplied.

Fr Roger Prowd is the St Peter's Prayer Link coordinator. The others in the Prayer Link at this inaugural stage are: Fr Hugh, Di Clark, Xeverie Swee, and Peter Yewers. We anticipate bringing one or two other members of the Pastoral Care team onto the Prayer Link in the coming weeks. Who these new members are will be communicated clearly in the weekly Pew Sheet.

Confidentiality is of course paramount to this model of prayer support, so be assured that prayer requests will be kept strictly private amongst the Prayer Link group. Prayer requests will not be made public at Mass, nor shown in the Pew Sheet.

To ensure effective, confidential and accurate communication, all prayer requests should be made to the coordinator, Fr Roger, only. Fr Roger will then pass the request to the others in the Prayer Link. If you would like additional confidentiality for your prayer request, just mention this to Fr Roger, and your petition will be circulated to the Prayer Link group anonymously.
