

Mass setting: Communion Service by John Rutter (b. 1945)

Celebrant: In the name of the Father + and of the Son

and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Lord be with you. **And also with you.**

The celebrant chants the collect for purity.

Let us pray: Almighty God,

to whom all hearts are open, all desires known,

and from whom no secrets are hidden:

cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit,

that we may perfectly love you,

and we may perfectly to ve you,

and worthily magnify your holy name,

through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The cantor sings: Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy.

The celebrant introduces the confession:

Let us confess our sins in penitence and faith, confident in God's forgiveness.

Merciful God, our maker and our judge,

We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed,

And in what we have failed to do:

We have not loved you with our whole heart;

We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves;

We repent and are sorry for all our sins.

Father, forgive us. Strengthen us to love and obey you In newness of life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The celebrant pronounces the absolution:

Almighty God,

Who has promised forgiveness of sins

to all those who turn to him in faith:

+ pardon you and set you free from all your sins,

strengthen you in all goodness

and keep you in eternal life,

through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Gloria.

Glory to God in the highest and peace to God's people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the **+** glory of God the Father. Amen.

The celebrant prays the Collect.

O God, whose Son has shown the way of the cross To be the way of life: transform and renew our minds That we may not be conformed to this world But may offer ourselves wholly to you as a living sacrifice Through Jesus Christ our Saviour; who lives and reigns With you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD


THE FIRST READING: Jeremiah 20:7-9

Jeremiah cried out to the Lord: "O Lord, you have enticed me, and I was enticed; you have overpowered me, and you have prevailed. I have become a laughingstock all day long; everyone mocks me. For whenever I speak, I must cry out, I must shout, 'Violence and destruction!' For the word of the Lord has become for me a reproach and derision all day long. If I say, 'I will not mention him, or speak any more in his name,' then within me there is something like a burning fire shut up in my bones; I am weary with holding it in, and I cannot."

The cantor leads the singing of the Psalm. Please join in the response.




THE EPISTLE: Romans 12:1-2

I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect.

Hear the word of the Lord; thanks be to God.

THE GOSPEL: Matthew 16:21-27

The cantor leads the singing of the antiphon. Please join in the response.



The celebrant: The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Glory to you + Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus sternly warned his disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah. From that time on, Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised. And Peter took Jesus aside and began to rebuke him, saying, "God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you." But he turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life? For the Son of

Man is to come with his angels in the glory of his Father, and then he will repay everyone for what has been done."

Pray, my brothers and sisters, that our sacrifice may be acceptable to God, the Almighty Father.

to the praise and glory of his name,

for our good and the good of all his Church.

Celebrant: The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The celebrant continues the prayer, leading to

Christ will come again.


Celebrant: We worship you, Father Almighty,

in songs of never-ending praise ...

Blessing and honour and glory and power

Are yours for ever and ever. Amen.

Celebrant: As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray:



Celebrant: We who are many are one body,

for we all share in the one bread.

All remaining kneeling.

Jesus, Lamb of God: have mercy on us. Jesus, bearer of our sins: have mercy on us. Jesus, redeemer of the world: give us your peace.

Celebrant: Behold the Lamb of God,

who takes away the sin of the world.

Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you,

but only say the word and I shall be healed.

The Sacrament is shared amongst those present; those viewing from home are invited into spiritual communion.

Communion Motet: C. Saint-Saëns (1835-1921) O salutaris hostie.

At the conclusion of Holy Communion there is a short time of silent prayer before singing the hymn.

Refrain: Lift high the cross, the love of Christ proclaim 'Till all the world adore his sacred name.

- 2. Each newborn servant of the Crucified Bears on the brow the seal of Christ who died.
