### Vicar's Musings

Today is our annual Parish Giving Sunday. As good Anglo-Catholics, many of us experience a certain discomfort talking about money in church. But money is an essential element of church life: without our Parish offerings and donations, the worship we know and love would cease; the Choir concert program needs to be funded; our service of the poor has been taken to a different level because of money donated; and, frankly, the roof won't fix itself! In today's gospel our Lord puts it like this: "You cannot serve God and wealth." This and other Scriptures challenge us to consider our ethics concerning money. Does our wealth serve our own selfish needs, or do we use our resources to serve the poor and needy?

The St Peter's coffee caravan social enterprise, "Heaven at the Hill" has completed its second week of Monday to Friday trading on the new Corner Plaza. Income is tracking remarkably close to the projections that our volunteer Operations Manager, Dr Ree Boddé, and the Management Committee presented to the various Parish committees last year in the Business Plan; which means that as a church we now have a viable social-inclusion hospitality business on our hands! "Heaven" will provide: real jobs for at least two disadvantaged job seekers from next month; \$12,000 a year in rental to the parish; and all our yearly surplus will go to the St Peter's Charitable Foundation to provide support for those experiencing homelessness. At its core, this is a business that is dedicated to serving the poor.





Another social enterprise, that has been operating for years, is the St Peter's Bookroom. In recent times the Manager, Carol O'Connor, and her team, have established a yearly Book Fair to bolster funds and provide an important outreach event for the St Peter's faith community. This year was by far the best yet! Our thanks to Carol and all the many volunteers for this sterling effort. The Bookroom, at its core, is about community and outreach; as the organisers write:

Book Fair 2019 is over! Thanks to the dozens of willing helpers in the St Peter's community and beyond for donating books, bump in, sorting, selling, refreshments and bump out. The Book Fair this year was unquestionably the biggest and best yet. Additional to significantly more books there was a sausage sizzle organised by the Stranieri family and coffee cart by Adolf. Book Fair 2019 was a resounding sales success — a total takings of just on \$8,100 including the sausage sizzle, which is a 70% increase on last year. Recognising the complexity of the undertaking, a big difference in 2019 was dedicated early planning. A small coordinating committee started meeting in February and focused on numerous tasks, deadlines and the people involved. Now the dust has settled, and (almost) all the books are gone, there is time for reflection: what does the Book Fair achieve? Ultimately, it's about faith and reading communities across Melbourne coming together, with the climax of a bustling weekend of book sales. So many fossickers from all walks of life were delighted to find their \$2 nuggets. Everybody was reminded of the presence of St Peter's; and St Peterites got to work together as a community with a common purpose. It's hard to quantify, but perhaps you could say it's about the warp and weft that weaves the community of St Peter's within the context of the broader Christian reading public.



### Second Reading: 1 Timothy 2.1-7

My dearly beloved, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone, for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity. This is right and is acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour, who desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. For there is one God; there is also one mediator between God and the human race, Christ Jesus, himself human, who gave himself a ransom for all; this was attested at the right time.

For this I was appointed a herald and an apostle, a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and truth. I am telling the truth, I am not lying.

### **Gospel**: Luke 16.1-13

Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that the manager was squandering his property. So the rich man summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' "Then the manager said to himself, What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes. "Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."


#### **CLIMATE CHANGE**


#### **GETTING THERE:**

  your meal.








