

one God, now and for ever. Amen


WELCOME TO ST PETER'S

COVID-19 restrictions have once again been tightened, and clearly the virus has not yet been eradicated; we must still remain vigilent. If you prefer, do join us online: www.facebook.com/stpeterseasternhill or www.youtube.com/c/StPetersEasternHill.

For those attending Mass in person, please read carefully and observe all the requisite COVID-Safe guidelines below:

- If you are feeling unwell, especially with COVID-19-type symptoms, you must not be at church; please go home now and get tested.
- our current density quotient at St Peter's allows for up to 110 people in the pews, and a total congregation (including choir, servers, children's church, overflow etc) of up to 174 people.
- If you have booked a pew, a sidesperson will tick off your name on arrival.
- If you have not booked, that's fine, you can scan the QR Code on your smart phone, or just give us your first name and phone number.
- Masks are once again obligatory in church. Other than those leading the service, everyone must wear a mask at all times.
- The new 2sqm spatial distancing essentially means keeping an elbow's distance from others at all times (other than partners and immediate family members, of course).
- Please continue to sanitise your hands as you enter or leave church.
- Communion will continue in one kind only, with no common cup.
- Do not to shake hands, hug, or kiss others beyond your immediate family.
- All service booklets are single-use only, so please take yours home.

Please note: we have a busy program of worship and social service at St Peter's Eastern Hill, seven days a week, but the church and hall are cleaned and sanitised daily, under WorkSafe pandemic guidelines, so you can be assured of the cleanliness of our buildings and furnishings.

Lay Minister's Musings

A common thread in this week's readings is God's presence in human time. We rightly understand God as transcending time, but because God the Son, Jesus Christ, dwelt among us we also know God operates within it. God uses time to reveal Himself, to keep us alert, to give urgency to prophecy and to bring us back to the fold. In the life of the Church, we mark the eternal purposes of God with finite seasons, days and solemnities. In Sacred Scripture, God pushes through the infinite to the finite again and again. God's timing, while mysterious, is also definite. Nineveh has forty days to repent—to take seriously the prophecy of God's servant Jonah. Nineveh declares a fast, covers itself in sackcloth and ashes and is saved. Paul's epistle to the Corinthians continues this theme of God's operating in human time. "Time is short", the epistle reminds us, and the current, impermanent world is passing away. We must align our sense of urgency with God's, our sense of individual identity with identity in Christ. This theme continues in Mark, when Jesus proclaims the coming of the Kingdom of God. The coming of the Kingdom is imminent, it is drawing closer to us in time—it has, in fact, reached its fulfilment in the person of Jesus Christ.

But why might God operate within, rather than just beyond time? To redeem us and allow us to partake of His divine nature, God had to become one of us. To reveal Himself to us, the infinite God had to speak a finite language we could understand. Consider again the Incarnation, the most perfect manifestation of God's presence in time. But consider also today's story from Jonah, or even God's saving of the Israelites, from their flight from Egypt to their wandering in the Wilderness of Sin. Although beyond time, God remains active in time so His great works can be enacted and revealed.

The notion of God's time has perhaps never been more pertinent for us, as we regroup from a year of upheaval. A friend said to me recently that if 2020 was holding one's breath then 2021 is a slow, staggered breathing out. This comparison struck me as apt. Like many Australians, I have family members across the globe whom I can't see, including my parents, who are safely ensconced in COVID-free Samoa. It is painful to be separated from family, without any clear prospect of reunion, and I know throughout the world many are experiencing the same feeling of separation. Last year, I took comfort in the story of the Israelites in the desert being fed Manna from heaven, because it reminded me of God's faithfulness. This year, I'm trying to remind myself not just of God's transcendence but also of His use of time as a means of self-revelation. I know God will bring to bear a season of coming together after this season of separation, but in His time.

EPIPHANY CHALK BLESSING



GROUP REFLECTION ON GONDWANA THEOLOGY WITH FR GREG

A Trawloolway man reflects on Christian Faith by Garry Worete Deverell.

This book is part of the Exploring Faith Matters program for this year as we explore the theme of Living Faithfully in a Multi-cultural world.

"In this brief volume Garry wrestles with questions Indigenous Christians everywhere regularly confront. As have others before him he asks, "How does an Indigenous person authentically make the faith that has been used as a means of oppression of him and his people, the ultimate source of his liberation from that oppression?" "furthermore," he inquires, "how can he challenge the White Christian world that has all but subsumed his and his people's lives in theirs, with the need for reconciliation and



change of heart, if their own hearts continue to harbour only bitterness, resentment, and anger?" The key concern is, of course, "What will it require of each of us to live together well in the land?"

Dr Terry LeBlanc North American Institute for Indigenous Theological Studies

Garry Worete Deverell is a Trawloolway man from northern Tasmania who currently lives in Melbourne. He is Anglican priest and has a PhD in liturgy and philosophical theology from Monash University.


