A Warden's Musings

Remember the ancient peoples of this land and forgive the sins of ignorance and neglect done against them.

So we pray as part of the Great Litany on the first Sundays of Advent and Lent. A prayer that hardly does justice to the depth and breadth of the wrongs committed against Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders since the first European settlers arrived on this day in 1788, and a prayer which, if we pray it in earnest, makes commemorating the arrival of those settlers more than a little complicated.

Of course, Australia Day is about much more than the arrival of convicts and their captors on a beach in what is now Sydney. There are many, many things to value about this nation and its people, drawn as we are from every country on earth, speaking as we do in many languages and traditions, joined together as we are in a vibrant community. The recent horrors of bushfire and flood have brought forth many examples of courage and generosity that reflect the best of what being Australian might mean and which deserve to be celebrated. But there's a march happening today not far from St Peters that reminds us that 26 January might not be the best date on which to have that celebration, burdened as it is by the terrible lie of terra nullius and the ongoing impacts of dispossession and colonisation on those whose ancestors were already here when Captain Arthur Phillip came ashore.

Whatever the view you take on when and how Australia Day should be marked, our readings today encourage us to a longer range view of the divisions and disagreements that we face in our lives as Christians. Isaiah foresees the great light that is Christ, coming to those who have been in darkness, breaking the burdens under which they have laboured. The psalmist looks forward to dwelling in the house of the Lord, and counsels us to have courage and to wait with faith. St Paul appeals to us to be of one mind and not to quarrel over minor differences when we are all saved by the power of God through the cross. And the gospel reading for today, with Christ calling our patron saint Peter and his brother Andrew, has given me the perfect opportunity to select hymn 353, with its beautiful melody by Parry and its words by American Quaker and abolitionist John Greenleaf Whittier.

Dear Lord and Father of mankind, Forgive our foolish ways! Reclothe us in our rightful mind, In purer lives Thy service find, In deeper reverence, praise.

Breathe through the heats of our desire Thy coolness and Thy balm; Let sense be dumb, let flesh retire; Speak through the earthquake, wind, and fire, O still, small voice of calm.



Mass Readings

First Reading: Isaiah 49.3, 5-6

The Lord spoke to me and said: "There will be no gloom for those who were in anguish. In the former time the Lord brought into contempt the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the latter time he will make glorious the way of the sea, the land beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the nations. The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness— on them light has shined. You have multiplied the nation, you have increased its joy; they rejoice before you as with joy at the harvest, as people exult when dividing plunder. For the yoke of their burden, and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian."

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 1.10-13, 17-18

I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there are quarrels among you, my brothers and sisters. What I mean is that each of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to

Cephas," or "I belong to Christ." Has Christ been divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? For Christ did not send me to baptize but to proclaim the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its power. For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 4.12-23

When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what had been spoken through the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: "Land of Zebulun, land of Naphtali, on the road by the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles— the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned." From that time Jesus began to proclaim, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea, for they were fishermen. And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of people." Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him. Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people.


VICTORIAN BUSHFIRE EMERGENCY APPEAL


Alive in God: A Christian Imagination by Timothy Radcliffe
