



Mass Readings

First Reading: 2 Maccabees 7.1-2, 9-14

It happened that seven brothers and their mother were arrested and were being compelled by King Antiochus, under torture with whips and thongs, to partake of unlawful swine's flesh. One of the brothers, speaking for all, said, "What do you intend to ask and learn from us? For we are ready to die rather than transgress the laws of our ancestors." After the first brother had died, they brought forward the second for their sport. And when he was at his last breath, he said to King, "You accursed wretch, you dismiss us from this present life, but the King of the universe will raise us up to an everlasting renewal of life, because we have died for his laws." After him, the third was the victim of their sport. When it was demanded, he quickly put out his tongue and courageously stretched forth his hands, and said nobly, "I got these from Heaven, and because of God's laws I disdain them, and from God I hope to get them back again." As a result the king himself and those with him were astonished at the young man's spirit, for he regarded his sufferings as nothing. After the third brother too had died, they maltreated and tortured the fourth in the same way. When he was near death, he said to his torturers, "One cannot but choose to die at the hands of mortals and to cherish the hope God gives of being raised again by him. But for you, there will be no resurrection to life!"

And we have confidence in the Lord concerning you, that you are doing and will go on doing the things that we command. May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and to the steadfastness of Christ.

Gospel: Luke 20.27-38

Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Those who belong to this age marry and are given in marriage; but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. Indeed they cannot die any more, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection. And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. Now he is God not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all of them are alive."


Fr Hugh Kempster, Vicar

Dear people of St Peter's, Eastern Hill,

I have enjoyed being part of the parish community for the past 12 months and am grateful to Fr Hugh for accepting my application to be part of the honorary clergy team. I am looking forward to being with you on occasion in this way after an initial time of being nourished by the worship and music of this lovely church. Surely the parish's unique role in this diocese is now needed more than ever.

Part of the antidote to the toxicity of our stressful times is found here for me in the experience of worship that St Peter's provides — peaceful, deeply reflective and aesthetically beautiful. It does not remove me from the struggles that life brings but restores perspective to them and brings healing. I thought it might be helpful to write a little about myself by way of introduction. I have been an Anglican priest for over 30 years and retired from full-time ministry in early 2017 after ten years as vicar of St Stephen's, Gardenvale, followed by a half-time locum for twelve months at St Peter's, Murrumbeena. Prior to Gardenvale I worked for twelve years as a hospital chaplain and in aged care chaplaincy, and before that five years as vicar of St Agnes', Black Rock.

At present I work part-time as the Anglican chaplain at Caulfield Hospital and take occasional locums. I am married to Kate who was consecrated a bishop in October last year. Kate and I met at the United Faculty of Theology when we were studying there in the early 1980's. We have three lovely daughters, two grown up (Phoebe 30 and Cordelia 27) and Eleanor who is 15. Thank you for your fellowship and the richness that your community offers.

Foundations of Anglican Evangelicalism in Victoria: Four Elements for Continuity, 1847-1937

For more than half a century, the Anglican Diocese of Melbourne was unquestionably the most rigorously evangelical and missions-oriented diocese in Australia. The Diocese of Sydney, in that same period, was decidedly broader in theological and liturgical practice. How and why did Melbourne move in one direction, while Sydney in the other? This study suggests that the answers are to be found in four vital contributors: local churches, evangelical societies, theological colleges, and diocesan bishops. For three broad periods of history between 1847 and 1937, the presence of these four



contributors is uncovered, described, and evaluated for the Diocese of Melbourne. Evangelical activism, theological reflection, and leadership are each shown in their contemporary contexts to help us understand how people with gospel passion sought to respond faithfully to their times. \$49.95
