Vicar's Musings

It is a joy to announce this year's two Klingner Scholars, who will be undertaking Trinity College Theological School placements at St Peter's as they prepare for ordination: Paul Daniels and Brenda Williams. Harold Klingner was a parishioner of St Peter's, who gave a bequest in 1975 of six thousand dollars: "the income of which I desire should be used to help any member of the St Peter's Guild of the Servers of the Sanctuary who is accepted as a candidate for Holy Orders, or other suitable candidate nominated by the Vicar". The Klingner Trustees have carefully managed the bequest over the years, and the corpus now enables the parish to grant annual scholarships to one or two ordinands, also providing training opportunities through the wide range of ministries that St Peter's has to offer.

Paul's placement will be Sunday-focused, engaging with the 9.30am Family Mass and 11am High Mass congregations on a fortnightly basis. Brenda is training to be a Hospital Chaplain, and so will be undertaking her placement primarily at St Vincent's Public and Private hospitals. Paul and Brenda will be commissioned on Sunday 3rd March at the 9.30am and 11am Masses. We look forward to the great privilege of journeying with Paul and Brenda towards their ordination, and will hold them up regularly in our prayers. Below are a few words that each of them have written by way of an introduction.

PAUL DANIELS

Hello to you all at St Peter's Eastern Hill – how exciting to be joining you during 2019! I'm a PhD student at Trinity College and a candidate for ordination in the Diocese of Bendigo, where I live with my family. My wife, Suzannah, was a Klingner Scholar back in 2014 and is now the priest for the Anglican Parish of Bendigo North. We have two children: Elizabeth is two, and little Felix arrived just before Christmas last year. If you have a spare few hours, I will talk your ear off about my thesis, which is in the write-up stage this year. I'm researching the early work of the Catholic theologian Hans Urs von Balthasar (1905-88) and his reading of the philosopher Friedrich Nietzsche (who provocatively announced that "God is dead"). This follows on from an MA(Theol), also at Trinity College, and from research in my book, Nietzsche and The Birth of Tragedy (Routledge, 2014).

A Gospel passage which has stuck with me most deeply in recent years is from Matthew 25, where we are told that our service to the vulnerable and marginalised is service to Christ himself (this is represented very movingly in sculptures by Timothy Schmalz,

and Tolstoy's short story Where there is Love, God is there Also). Matthew 25 has shaped my vision for service in the church and church life itself: to sing praise to God while at the same time reaching out to our less fortunate brothers and sisters. These are things which are thriving at St Peter's, and it will be a joy to join you in worship!

BRENDA WILLIAMS

Brenda hails from England; grew up in a very active Church of England family and studied nursing and midwifery before serving as a medical missionary in NE Nigeria for 5 years. She arrived permanently in Australia in 1986 and audited subjects at Ridley College while working at The Royal Melbourne Hospital. Whilst being involved in many aspects of parish life at St John's Camberwell, St James Dandenong and St Marks Dromana, she comes to St Peter's following experience as a Lay-Reader, Authorised Lay Minister and Pastoral Care Minister at St George's Red Hill, and having most recently undertaken a second major placement at St John's, Toorak.

After 35 years as a Registered Nurse, Midwife and working in hospital management, and following the death of her daughter-in-law, Brenda felt a need to change the emphasis of her relationships with hospital staff, patients and relatives. She spent 3 years training in Clinical Pastoral Education and subsequently was employed as a Pastoral Care Practitioner, mainly in palliative and intensive care wards. After attending a Selection Conference in July 2016 Brenda accepted the Archbishop's offer to become an Ordination Candidate with The Anglican Diocese of Melbourne. Since then she has been studying at Trinity College Theological School. Her studies were interrupted in 2017 by the need to care for both her parents in UK as they each in turn required palliative and end of life care. She now hopes to complete a Graduate Diploma in Theology in 2019 without further interruption.

Brenda has three adult children - one married, one to be married in May and the other expected by the end of the year! One of her greatest delights in life was becoming a grandparent last October. She very much enjoys activities with her family and their two standard poodles. Brenda is committed to her vows as a Benedictine Oblate of The Abbey, Jamberoo, and appreciates stillness and silence as well as classical music. She is very grateful to be awarded a Klingner Scholarship and excited to join God's work at St Peter's as she extends her experience in hospital Spiritual Care, preparing for ordination as a Anglican Hospital Chaplain.

STATUTORY PARISH MEETINGS - SUNDAY 17TH MARCH, 1PM



Mass Readings

First Reading: Isaiah 6.1-2a, 3-8

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings. And one called to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory." The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!" Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: "Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I "Here am I; send me!"

Psalm: 138.1-2a, 2b-3, 4-5, 7c-8



I give you thanks, O Lord, with my whole heart; before the gods I sing your praise; I bow down toward your holy temple. I give thanks to your name for your steadfast love and your faithfulness. R. For you have exalted your name and your word above everything. On the day I called, you answered me, you increased my strength of soul. R. All the kings of the earth shall praise you, O Lord, for they have heard the words of your mouth. They shall sing of the ways of the Lord, for great is the glory of the Lord. You stretch out your hand, and your right hand delivers me. The Lord will fulfil his purpose for me; your steadfast love, O Lord, endures forever. Do not forsake the work of your hands. R.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15.1-11

I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand. This is the good news through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you— unless you have come to believe in vain. For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then Christ appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, Christ appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of the apostles - though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

Gospel: Luke 5.1-11

While Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. Jesus got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signalled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" For Simon Peter and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people." When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed Jesus.

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS SEMINAR AT ST PETER'S

TUESDAY 30TH APRIL AT 10AM - 3PM IN THE PARISH HALL

It is a requirement of Archbishop in Council that all the following members of St Peter's Eastern Hill attend at least one Professional Standards Seminar in 2019: Clergy, Parish Lay Staff, Churchwardens, Parish Council members, Lay Ministers, and key parish volunteers (e.g servers, children's ministry etc). Please note that these training seminars are different from the OH&S sessions that were run in 2015. The Professional Standards seminars have been updated from the previous training that most Clergy have attended. Professional Standards Seminars should be completed every 3 years and anyone who has not attended a seminar since 2014 should attend one in 2019.

To assist St Peter's staff and volunteers in fulfilling this Diocesan requirement, we are hosting our own Professional Standards Seminar, facilitated by Ms Angela Cannon, at St Peter's Eastern Hill on Tuesday 30th April between 10am and 3pm in the Parish Hall. Tea and Coffee will be provided. Delegates will be required to sign the attendance sheet at the conclusion of the seminar to allow for entry into the Diocesan and Parish databases.

We are aware that this time may not suit everyone. If you are unable to attend this seminar, you will need to attend one of the other 2019 Diocesan Seminars. A list of these can be found at https://bit.ly/2WUY6Ua

Please note: If you have attended a Professional Standards Act seminar in the past three years you do not need to attend this seminar again. If you have not attended any – you are required to do so if you are in a ministry or key volunteer role.


