Vicar's Musings

Summer fruits! On the facing page are just a few glimpses into the encouraging fruition of the St Peter's Corner Plaza and Social Enterprise project that has taken place over the past week. It is well known that the biggest effort in any building or development project is raising it "out of the dirt." For the Corner Plaza and Wayside Cross development it has been no different. The project began nearly four years ago, with a parish meeting to consider plans drawn up by Tract Landscaping. The St Peter's Charitable Foundation then kicked into gear, and since then has raised a phenomenal \$400,000. Trethowan Architects were commissioned to refine the plans and finally Landstruct started work last August. Parishioners would often comment: it seems to be going very slowly. But those of us here during the week saw all the work that was taking place: digging the foundations, carefully laying cables, putting down the blue stone pavers, the never-ending job of grouting, and the list goes on.

This past week, as the landscaper's deadline approaches, we have seen a flurry of completions: the St Peter's sign, the beautiful curved bench, the back-lighting, the watering system. I've also had the privilege of speaking at Melbourne Grammar School, to thank Bruce House for the nearly \$5,000 that the boys raised at the end of 2018; they too are excited to hear that the project is nearing completion. On Thursday this week it was a joy to pick up the caravan from which we will be selling coffee five days a week on the Corner Plaza, and providing training and volunteering opportunities for those experiencing homelessness. A successful crop of summer fruits in an orchard takes an enormous amount of hard work over the year, indeed over many years. As we enjoy the fruits of this project over the coming weeks, ahead of a formal opening on St Peter's Day, a huge thank you to all of you who have contributed in so many ways: the Social Enterprise Committee, the coffee-cart-pilot volunteers, the Charitable Foundation, the Fundraising Committee, the Parish Council, and all who have contributed financially or in kind over these past four year. *Deo gratias!*

FLOWERS IN CHURCH


Flowers in church today are donated by Anthony Schepis, in loving memory of his father Andrew Schepis, whose year's mind was Saturday 23rd February.

Mass Readings

First Reading: 1 Samuel 26.2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-25

Having heard that David was hiding out in the desert, Saul rose and went down to the Wilderness of Ziph, with three thousand chosen men of Israel, to seek David in the Wilderness of Ziph. David and Abishai went into Saul's army by night; there Saul lay sleeping within the encampment, with his spear stuck in the ground at his head; and Abner and the army lay around him. Abishai said to David, "God has given your enemy into your hand today; now therefore let me pin him to the ground with one stroke of the spear; I will not strike him twice." But David said to Abishai, "Do not destroy him; for who can raise his hand against the Lord's anointed, and be guiltless?" So David took the spear that was at Saul's head and the water jar, and they went away. No one saw it, or knew it, nor did anyone awake; for they were all asleep, because a deep sleep from the Lord had fallen upon them. Then David went over to the other side, and stood on top of a hill far away, with a great distance between them. David called aloud to Saul, "Here is the spear, O king! Let one of the young men come over and get it. The Lord rewards everyone for his righteousness and his faithfulness; for the Lord gave you into my hand today, but I would not raise my hand against the Lord's anointed. As your life was precious today in my sight, so may my life be precious in the sight of the Lord, and may he rescue me from all tribulation." Then Saul said to David, "Blessed be you, my son David! You will do many things and will succeed in them." So David went his way, and Saul returned to his place.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15.45-50

It is written: "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first was from the earth, made of dust; the second is from heaven. As was the one of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the one of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the one of dust, we will also bear the image of the one of heaven. What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

Gospel : Luke 6.27-38

Jesus addressed a great crowd of his disciples, together with the multitude from Judea, Jerusalem, Tyre and Sidon. "I say to you that listen: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. Do to others as you would have them do to you. If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back."

An exhibition of paintings on Dante La Vita Nuova

The images in La Vita Nuova are meditation pieces. The work consists of a number of small paintings inscribed with Dante's text.

The figure is in a state of meditation, or preparation: the viewer is invited to approach this meditating figure in various circumstances recalled by the script. These words evoke transitoriness, fragility, the impermanence of human life: mortality.

The story is also a reflection on the idea of undying love.

La Vita Nuova was first exhibited at St Francis' Pastoral Centre: St Francis' Church, Lonsdale Street in 2001. It is dedicated to the memory of Rachel Barber, who departed this life in 1999 at the age of fifteen.


