

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD


Exodus 32.7-11, 13-14

At the top of Mount Sinai, the Lord said to Moses, "Go down at once! 
THE EPISTLE: 1 TIMOTHY 1.12-17 chanted by the Sub-Deacon

WEEKLY REFLECTIONS

From the Vicar

Dear friends,

The parables of the lost sheep, the lost coin and the lost child (the prodigal son, which completes the set of three parables set for Sunday) are Jesus' prophetic challenge to me to decide which side I am on. Wise teachers, from St Ignatius Loyola to Jerome Berryman, the creator of 'Godly play', advise us to ask a question about sacred stories. 'Where do you find yourself in the story?' So I ask myself this: for all my self-deprecation, am I at heart among those who are quietly proud of their status and probity? We can never let go of honest self-examination.

We read these familiar stories, often, with too much detachment. We rightly see them as portraying Jesus' priorities – 'the poor' come first – and we correctly conclude that the Church should have these same priorities in its own mission. Much will be said along these lines from our pulpits this Sunday: this is practical Christianity which so often does more to unite us than technical conversations. A notable feature of Pope Francis' emphasis for the worldwide church is attending to the 'Church on the Margins' (which his latest Consistory, appointing new Cardinals, has once again promoted).

But this teaching isn't just about the massive problems of economic injustice in the world, which I can comfortably leave to the great and the good, or not so good, our political leaders. These stories have passed me by unless I recognise that they dramatize my own predicament. A useful exercise is to recall, as most of us can, some occasion in our own experience, possibly from childhood, when we have found ourselves lost, and to remind ourselves how devastating and desolating that was. I'm sure that, like me, you have some early childhood memory of losing sight of your parent in a public place and the raw panic which that produced. It is a horrible experience, even if my own lostness is a result of my own wilfulness and folly. The truth is that, baptized and confirmed, 'in good standing' with my church and nice to my neighbours, I never cease to be the lost sheep in desperate need of the good shepherd. When we hear these parables, we are to cast ourselves as the lost sheep, the lost coin and the prodigal son. That is where I am in the story; that is my desperate plight *and* my only hope. If I see myself in the comfortable majority, I am immediately a scribe and a Pharisee.
