WEEKLY REFLECTIONS

Fr Philip Gill writes ...

Those ten men cried out in anguish in the belief that Jesus had the power to heal them. And he did. Healing is at the heart of Jesus' message and therefore belongs at the heart of the church's ministry. In an article on the *Anglican Compass* website Episcopal priest Hannah King asks the evocative question, 'Why should an Anglican church have a healing ministry?' It is a loaded question as she goes on to share her experience of healing. King suffered for years with chronic back pain and had been prayed for many times. Then one Sunday morning she answered the call to come forward for prayers. Her pain left and in eight years since has never returned. She concludes that even in the light of the many questions that surround the healing ministry, along with a sound *theology of suffering* we need an *imagination for healing*. Worship that focusses on healing reveals the church's vulnerability. She concludes: 'It is messy, but it is a mess in which God is present'.

Both the healing of the lepers and Hannah King's experience help us to see the church's ministry of healing encompasses much more than physical recovery. Christian healing involves acceptance, or perhaps more pointedly, freedom from blame. In ancient times suffering was seen as a punishment for wrongdoing. We hear echoes of this response to suffering even today. The lepers felt confident in approaching Jesus and he engaged with them. That interaction enabled healing to occur. Then there is the importance of community. The lepers were excluded from community life until they could be pronounced cleansed by the priests. Jesus openly told them to present themselves to the priests so this this inclusion could occur. King had her community around her all the time she sought healing. Finally, but importantly as the story of the one grateful leper illustrates is gratitude. There is much in Hannah King's experience and reflection that helps the church understand its ministry of healing. There are aspects of her story that resonate with the healing of the ten lepers and point to what might be considered essentially 'Christian' especially a sense of acceptance, belonging and gratitude.
