



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

2 Maccabees 7.1-2, 9-14

A reading from the second book of Maccabees.

It happened that seven brothers and their mother were arrested and were being compelled by King Antiochus, under torture with whips and thongs, to partake of unlawful swine's flesh. One of the brothers, speaking for all, said, "What do you intend to ask and learn from us? For we are ready to die rather than transgress the laws of our ancestors." After the first brother had died, they brought forward the second for their sport. And when he was at his last breath, he said to King, "You accursed wretch, you dismiss us from this present life, but the King of the universe will raise us up to an everlasting renewal of life, because we have died for his laws." After him, the third was the victim of their sport. When it was demanded, he quickly put out his tongue and courageously stretched forth his hands, and said nobly, "I got these from Heaven, and because of God's laws I disdain them, and from God I hope to get them back again." As a result the king himself and those with him were astonished at the young man's spirit, for he regarded his sufferings as nothing. After the third brother too had died, they maltreated and tortured the fourth in the same way. When he was near death, he said to his torturers, "One cannot but choose to die at the hands of mortals and to cherish the hope God gives of being raised again by him. But for you, there will be no resurrection to life!"

Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to Jesus and asked him a question, "Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies, leaving a wife but no children, the man shall marry the widow and raise up children for his brother. Now there were seven brothers; the first married, and died childless; then the second and the third married her, and so in the same way all seven died childless. Finally, the woman also died. In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? —for the seven had married her." Jesus said to them, "Those who belong to this age marry and are given in marriage; but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. Indeed, they cannot die any more, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection. "And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. Now he is God not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all of them are alive."

At 9.30am the Sanctus is said and at 11.00am the choir sings the Sanctus.







To fulfil the requirements of the Act, and with respect to the Privacy Act, please contact the parish office to check your details on the current Roll.

You must apply to be included on the Electoral Roll by filling out an *Application for Enrolment* form, fulfilling the prerequisites stated. If you wish to be on the Electoral Roll or amend your details on the current roll, please fill out one of these forms, available from the back of the church and return to the parish office on or before **7 November 2022**.

Nomination forms for the election of two (2) Churchwardens and nine (9) Vestry members and two (2) Incumbency Committee members are also available from the back of the church. New Release! The Power of Reconciliation by Justin Welby

Welby writes about Reconciliation as seeking to disagree well. It relates to both religious and secular communities, from the household to the international. Conflict is widespread. With the after-effects of Covid, changes in science and technology, inequality, and increasingly polarized political and social strife, moves towards reconciliation are more necessary than ever.

The book is full of practical advice for all those in authority on how to bring about reconciliation. There is even a step-by-step guide for this, drawn from the author's own experience.

Welby deals with conflict and reconciliation within families, businesses, warfare between nations, races and all forms of political conflict. The book concerns the secular sphere every bit as much as the religious, though Welby's message is Christian inspired, and the influence of Desmond Tutu strongly felt.

WEEKLY REFLECTIONS

From Carol O'Connor

Keep me as the apple of the eye; hide me in the shadow of your wings (Psalm 17: 8) is a verse often said at Compline, that restful, reflective down-time of prayer given to us in the monastic hour before bed. When Bridie was very young, on our way to her Primary School in the car and after practicing times table or spelling, we would often tune into Classic Breakfast Program on ABC Classic FM. There, for the last 20 minutes of our trip we would enjoy listening to Emma Ayres, witty, vibrant musician and presenter of beautiful music chosen especially for early morning enjoyment.

In 2016 Ayres came out as transgender, Eddie Ayres. Last year, he published **Whole Notes: Life Lessons Through Music**. Married this year to Charlie, he has now taken on her name, Ed Le Brocq.

Complete with references to his choice music, **Whole Notes** is a deeply compassionate read; each chapter heading is something of its own list of the Fruits of the Spirit: Wisdom, Love, Bravery, Kindness... Ed writes:

I am more than a transgender man. I will transition, it will be hard, but it will be glorious. I will go through one of life's many great challenges and I will share my story, so that people might understand. I will let my past die, and I will let it be reborn in the new me. From Emma to Ed. A transformation from grief to hope.

Our prayer to be kept as the apple of God's eye, shielded under the shadow of the wings of the Holy Spirit, is the asking to help us know our whole selves as being deeply loved by God. And in this Love find the freedom to live, move and have our being in God. The Love of God grows us, quietly, secretly and slowly, from the inside. It may sometimes mean the need for courage to take necessary risks. But it always transforms us into someone bigger than we were before.

Once more in Luke's Gospel this morning, Jesus turns the table on people's thinking. Here, the arguments of the Sadducees, literalist and very clever, are shown to be rather silly when compared to those who live in the life of resurrection.

To be a child of the resurrection is to understand that dying to the self means an opening for more life; not diminution of it. Like Moses and the burning bush, our very shoes have to be taken off because here is utter mystery that breaks open not only our mind, but our own self. Our God is not of the dead, but the living. Fraught, painful, challenging, but also exquisitely amazing and humbling. As Moses saw. As Ed sees. And we too can glimpse.
