WELCOME TO ST PETER'S

Please read carefully and observe all the requisite COVID-Safe guidelines below:


- If you are feeling unwell, especially with COVID-19-type symptoms, you must not be at church; please go home now and get tested.
- Masks are not mandatory, but you are encouraged to wear them if you can't socially distance or when you sing.
- The 2m² density quotient at St Peter's allows for up to 110 people in the pews, and a total congregation (including choir, servers, children's church, overflow etc) of up to 174 people.
- 2m² spatial distancing essentially means keeping an elbow's distance from others at all times (other than partners and immediate family members).
- We provide sanitiser for your hands at the entrance to church.
- Holy Communion is in one kind only, with no common cup.
- You are advised not to shake hands, hug, or kiss others beyond your partner or immediate family.
- All service booklets are single use only, so please take yours home.

When you arrive at church you must "sign in" using the new State Government approved QR Code system at the door. If you have any difficulties, the sidesperson will assist you.

Please note: we have a busy programme of worship, social service and hall bookings at St Peter's Eastern Hill, seven days a week, but the church and hall are cleaned and sanitised daily, under WorkSafe pandemic guidelines, so you can be assured of the cleanliness of our buildings and furnishings.

Vicar's Warden's Musings

On 8 May parish leaders – from the Parish Council and other ministries – gathered at the lovely retreat house of the Community of the Holy Name to consider directions for the future of the parish. We started with a presentation and discussion on an evolving concept from Saint Martin's-in-the-fields in London which organises parish missions into four clusters: congregation; culture (in our case choir); compassion; and commerce, the latter to raise funds for the former. Fr Hugh will be organising a study series to explore this concept further and its implications for the Parish.

The group also considered the latest draft of the Parish's Mission Action Plan, which will serve us through into 2023. The current iteration will go to the Parish Council at its next meeting for further consideration. Importantly, the Draft Plan starts with a focus on describing what the Parish will be like:

We will be -

- a flourishing Anglo-Catholic community of faith
- a cohesive community built on shared values and respect where people are invited and supported to contribute their gifts to the service of the Church; and
- developing the next generation of lay and ordained leaders for both our community and the broader Anglo-Catholic tradition.

This is not only a statement about what the Parish as a whole will be, but it is also a statement about what each of the ministries of the Parish will be: the Servers' Guild will be a flourishing Anglo-Catholic community of faith, so too will be the Guild of Saint Benedict, the Bookroom and so on. Each of our ministries will, over time, need to reflect on how they are going in terms of these goals.

The Draft Mission Action Plan also sets out what we will focus on: We will focus on -

- renewal and deepening of Anglo-Catholic spirituality, liturgy, music and commitment to social action.
- faith development: sacramental and vocational formation.
- rebuilding pastoral care and a culture of trust and hospitality.

We can't do everything, and so we have to set priorities and new ideas will need to be assessed against these areas of focus.






Sunday Mass Readings

First Reading: Acts 2.1-11

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. Second Reading: Galatians 5.16-25

Brothers and sisters: Live by the Spirit, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

Gospel: John 15.26-27; 16.12-15

"When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who comes from the Father, he will testify on my behalf. You also are to testify because you have been with me from the beginning. I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now. When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you. All that the Father has is mine. For this reason I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you."

NEW CHECK-IN QR SYSTEM FOR THE PARISH - "GUEST TRACK"

In line with the Victorian State Government's new regulations, implemented last Friday, St Peter's is required to adopt a new QR Code system: "GuestTrack." Unfortunately "Try Booking" does not connect with the Service Victoria app. and is therefore no longer compliant. So, there is now no need to book-a-pew ahead of time when you come to St Peter's. Just come to church and sign-in at the door. If you have a smart phone, once you have registered, this will be very quick for you each Sunday. For those who don't have a smart phone, or Internet access, the sidespeople at Mass can sign in for you on the parish phone, or take your details as before. Please be patient, and kind towards our sidespeople, as we get this new system up and running. Thank you.

NOTES ON OUR LITURGY: THE PROPERS OF THE MASS

You may have noticed since we've returned to community worship after last year's extended lockdown there have been a couple of changes to our Mass, including the addition of some chanted prayers: The Introit, the Gradual (or Lesser Alleluia), Alleluia, the Offertory and the Communion Antiphon. Many of you are already familiar with the names of these different prayers, and often in the context of hymnody, e.g. the Gradual or Offertory hymn. But in their original context, these words refer to different parts of the Mass and the chanted prayers that accompanied them. For instance, the Gradual is technically the chanted prayer that covers the transition from the Epistle to the Gospel and the procession that accompanies it, whereas the Offertory refers to the chanted prayer that accompanies the preparation of the gifts on the altar, which are to be offered at the Mass.

Propers vs Ordinary

These chanted prayers are called the Propers of the Mass, in the sense that these prayers are "proper" to the day on which the Mass is celebrated. Along with the scripture readings and the collects and special prefaces that the priest says or chants (which are also known as propers) they help establish the theme of each Sunday or Solemnity. For instance, you'll notice that for Ascension Thursday and the Sunday within the Octave of Ascension, the Introit, Alleluia, Offertory, Communion Antiphon and the prayers and collects that the priest says are aligned with the theme of Christ's Ascension to the Father. The Propers are distinct from the Ordinary of the Mass, which refers to the prayers that are ordinarily heard on most Sundays and don't usually vary, irrespective of the Solemnity being celebrated. Examples of the Ordinary prayers are the Kyrie, the Gloria (when it isn't Lent or Advent), the Sanctus, the Benedictus and so on.

Textual origins

The proper prayers are usually taken from the Bible. For instance, the Communion Antiphon usually isolates a particular sentence that Jesus may have uttered in that week's Gospel, so we can meditate on it after we have received the Blessed Sacrament. Sometimes they come from the writings of saints and patriarchs. For example, on Pentecost we chant the Veni Sancte Spiritus, which is usually attributed to the 13th century Archbishop of Canterbury, Cardinal Stephen Langton.

Technically the Propers have never left our Masses at St Peter's! They are usually said aloud by the priest at our BCP Mass on Sunday mornings. The textual source for these propers came to our Anglo-Catholic charism through the English Missal, which in turn draws heavily on the extraordinary form of the Roman Rite, which we commonly call the "Latin Mass" e.g. the usual form of the Mass before the Second Vatican Council. It's worth noting, for High Mass, we don't draw on the English Missal but on approved current translations contained in the Roman Gradual; these are the most ancient and authoritative texts we have available.

While the Propers have never left our tradition, their use at our High Mass had fallen into abeyance. We've restored these chanted prayers because they enhance the thematic and scriptural richness of our Masses, using the Bible and the most ancient form of music in the church: chant.

The chanted Propers also provide further context for why we call certain Sundays special names. Gaudete Sunday, for instance, is called Gaudete Sunday because of text contained in the Introit of the day, from Phillipians: "Gaudete in Domino semper: iterum dico, Gaudete" which in English we know as "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice!"

In my next write-up I'll talk about Sequences (another kind of proper prayer): which ones we use, when we use them, and why they're important.




