Vicar's Musings

Last week, I received a most thoughtful and pastoral gift, Saul Frampton's intriguingly titled book, When I am Playing with My Cat, How do I Know She is Not Playing with Me? (Faber and Faber 2011). It is sub-titled, Montaigne and Being in Touch with Life. Michel de Montaigne (1533-92) was a Renaissance philosopher, famous for establishing the essay as an esteemed literary genre. Living, he was better known as a statesman, but his lasting legacy has been philosophical and literary. The list of those influenced by his essays is a who's who of the West's great thinkers and authors: from William Shakespeare to Isaac Asimov; René Descartes to Friedrich Nietzsche; Francis Bacon to Blaise Pascal, Jean-Jacques Rousseau to Ralph Waldo Emerson. Montaigne's contemporaries saw his essays as flippant, with their tendency to digress into personal anecdote. He famously wrote, "I am myself the matter of my book" and elsewhere Que sais-je? "What do I know?"; aphorisms with an almost twenty-first-century poignancy. In his first book of essays, published in 1580, Montaigne's central theme is death. He writes, "All the wisdom and reasoning in this world finally boils down to one point: to teach us not to be afraid to die."

Why ever, on this feast day of Pentecost, would I subject you to a reflection on death? Well, inspired by the great essayist perhaps, "I am the matter of this essay"; to a degree at least. My father died last month in New Zealand, and naturally I am working through the grief of that reality. But there are also good Biblical, theological, and pastoral reasons for a reflection on death at this time of Pentecost. Consider the scene: "When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all gathered in one place" (Acts 2:1). There are echoes here of chapter 20 of John's gospel, where the disciples have locked themselves into a house "for fear of the Jews" (v.19). The risen Christ appears, and symbolically breathes on the grieving disciples: "Receive the Holy Spirit." The Day of Pentecost is a day of transformation; a day when the eternal Spirit of God breathes life, vitality and new possibilities into the emptiness of grief and fear.

I may be the matter of this essay, but so too, I would argue, are we as a church. On my return from New Zealand one parishioner wrote to me bemoaning a "black cloud" hanging over St Peter's. Certainly, when there is conflict in a Christian community, it is a profoundly painful thing. We grieve the loss of unity and peace; the way things were. The Day of Pentecost cannot be hurried, or forced. It arrives in God's time; but it does come. As our Lord teaches Nicodemus: "The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes" (John 3:8). So in our locked upper rooms, in the darkness of grief that we all experience in one way or another, may we wait faithfully, in love, summoning what courage we can, in the sure and certain hope that our Lord breathes new life and hope; today and always.

MYSTICS ANONYMOUS - WINTER RECESS


The Wednesday afternoon contemplative prayer group, 'Mystics Anonymous', will be in recess over the winter. The group will be starting up again in Spring.

Mass Readings

First Reading: Acts 2.1-11

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because all heard them speaking in their own languages. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and converts, Cretans and Arabs— in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power."

Second Reading: Romans 8.8-17

Those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of God who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you. So then, brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh— for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ— if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

Gospel: John 14.15-16, 23b-26

Jesus spoke to the disciples: "If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them. Whoever does not love me does not keep my words; and the word that you hear is not mine, but is from the Father who sent me. I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you."




