WEEKLY MUSINGS

Maranatha.

So began Fr Hugh's sermon a few weeks ago. It was the greeting of the early Christians which could be interpreted as an imperative, "Come, Lord" or as a statement of belief, "the Lord has come."

Whatever the translation, it is an openness and a greeting.

Today we welcome our Archbishop and Mrs Joy Freier, as well as our former Bishop Philip Huggins and Liz Cuming. It is La Trobe Sunday, and so we are also joined by the La Trobe Society to commemorate one of the founders of our parish – I say one because mostly the credit is given to the former Lieutenant Governor, Charles La Trobe, but I would add as a founder, Sophie, his wife, whose commemorative plaque is opposite where I usually sit on Sundays.

It is also a celebration of the 175th anniversary of our foundation as a parish; and it is a celebration of the conclusion of Fr Hugh's ministry among us, with today being his last day as Vicar of St Peter's. The 5th December is also the day we celebrate St Nicholas, remembered for his generosity.

In these musings about Fr Hugh I'd like to quote the commemorative plaque for Christopher Wren in St Paul's Cathedral in London: *Lector si monumentum requiris circumspice*. This can be translated: "Reader, if a monument [to this man] you seek, look around you." And this too is relevant as we farewell Fr Hugh.

In the Mass today the Deacon is Mother Christine Angus, a former Klingner Scholar and member for many years of the Guild of Servers, who was sent into her ministry from this parish. The Archbishop's chaplain is Mother Pirriel. Neither could be in those roles but for Fr Hugh's leadership in discerning an inclusive future for this parish – one which welcomes the ministry of women – and then working with the parish to come to an agreement to accept ordained women in the sanctuary.

Look outside at St Peter's Place, a vision that opened up St Peter's to the outside world; some passers-by used not even to notice that there was a church here. Look outside next week and there on the Place will be the coffee caravan, an initiative of the St Peter's Eastern Hill Social Enterprise to raise funds for disadvantaged people and to provide a path into employment for those at risk of homelessness and others in necessitous circumstances. Look inside the Vicarage and you will see the handiwork of Fr Hugh and Ree who have done so much to restore this historic building to its original beauty.

Look around you today and you see St Peter's, a vibrant and thriving parish.

Fr Hugh leaves us after almost a decade. About one fifth of his ministry with us has been during the plague years – we have been a church in lockdown – we have been kept physically apart, but Fr Hugh has kept us spiritually together. Fr Hugh developed and led a thriving online ministry, including continuing our daily celebration of the Mass not, during COVID-19, to the faithful physically present but to a virtual congregation. On weekdays it was no longer just the faithful few physically, but now to a faithful congregation scattered across the globe. We discovered new friends in this way.

It has not always been easy for Fr Hugh and his family, but they are resilient. I have enjoyed my regular check-ins with Fr Hugh after the 7:15am Mass — even during lockdown I could meet up within my 5 km, have a walk, occasionally a coffee, a sit down and more recently, returning to one last breakfast sit down together.

During my six years as Vicar's Warden, Fr Hugh has been there as a partner, helping build the parish, and helping me to grow in faith too.

The transformation of St Peter's over Fr Hugh's tenure has been remarkable. The liturgy has changed – including women in the sanctuary as I mentioned. With the welcoming of Fr Greg we are national base for EfM. We will be celebrating in a Hall with heating and cooling, having meetings in the Henderson-Newton room, and so on. It is with gratitude that we thank Fr Hugh for his ministry among us; we wish him and Ree well in their future endeavours, and look forward to staying in touch.


In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah, "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

SENDING OUT OF GOD'S PEOPLE

The celebrant chants the final prayer, leading to:

Father, we offer ourselves to you as a living sacrifice through Jesus Christ our Lord. Send us out in the power of your Spirit to live and work to your praise and glory.

The Archbishop offers a blessing and the deacon dismisses the congregation: Go in peace to love and serve the Lord.

In the name of Christ, Amen.

The Sanctuary party processes to the West door for final prayers and dismissal.

All are warmly invited to the Parish Hall for a light lunch after Mass, where there will be speeches and a farewell to Fr Hugh and his family.

After the Mass, the Angelus will be said at (or around) 12noon by a small group at the West Door of the Church. Originating in the eleventh century, this is a devotional practice commemorating the Incarnation or the Annunciation. The name comes from its incipit or the first word of the text: Angelus Domini nuntiavit Mariæ "The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary." The devotion is observed by Roman Catholics and some Anglican, Western Rite Orthodox, and Lutheran churches. The angel referred to in the prayer is Gabriel, a messenger of God who revealed to the Virgin Mary that she would conceive a child to be born the Son of God (Luke 1:26–38).

It is practised by reciting as versicle and response three biblical verses narrating the mystery, alternating with the prayer "Hail Mary." This is traditionally done three times a day: at 6 a.m., midday and 6 p.m. It is usually accompanied by the ringing of the Angelus bell, which is a call to prayer. During the ringing of the bell, all activity ceases and people say the following prayer quietly to themselves or as a group.

L. The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary.

R. And she conceived of the Holy Spirit.

Hail Mary, full of grace,
The Lord is with Thee;
Blessed art thou among women,
And blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus.
Holy Mary, Mother of God,
Pray for us sinners,
Now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

- **R.** Be it done unto me according to your word. Hail Mary, etc.




BOOKS LAUNCH


