

Weekly Musings

The mood for the third week of Advent changes to one of joyful expectation as we reach the half-way stage in our preparation for the birth of Christ. Known as Gaudete Sunday (the Latin for 'rejoice'), here is an opportunity to focus on all that is good in our lives and to give heartfelt thanks. We rejoice in anticipation of the birth of our Saviour and reflect on our responsibility to care wisely for all creation.

Our modern world is so immediate that we have lost the joy of waiting patiently. The build-up to Christmas can be so frenetic that it's easy to lose sight of its true meaning.

Joy is not denial of reality. In the great prophets of Israel, in Jesus himself and in the saints, joy and suffering are an integral part of the fabric of their lives, so that we cannot begin to understand the meaning of the one without the other.

This is important to us as we react to the lockdowns of Covid 19. Joy is very much a part of our lives, not just because we have been released from restrictions but also because we have learned a lot about ourselves during this time. The extraordinary thing about the Covid lockdowns where I live is how neighbours acknowledge and know each other better than before lockdown. Something positive, some greater awareness has come out of the shared adversity.

As William Blake put it:

"Man was made for joy and woe Then when this we rightly know Through the world we safely go. Joy and woe are woven fine A clothing for the soul to bind."

The writer of the letter to the Hebrews says of Jesus that, "for the joy that was set before him he endured the Cross." We usually contrast joy and suffering; Blake saw that they were "woven fine". St Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "In our sorrows we have always cause for joy". (2 Cor 6:10)

To prepare for the Christmas celebration, for the coming of Jesus, it can be helpful to make space to sit quietly for a few minutes in the presence of God and spend time with Paul's words.

A prayer of Thomas More might encourage a balance this Advent. Pope Francis recommended it to his Cardinals and Bishops.

Prayer for Good Humour

Grant me, O Lord, good digestion, and also something to digest.

Grant me a healthy body, and the necessary good humour to maintain it.

Grant me a simple soul that knows to treasure all that is good

and that doesn't frighten easily at the sight of evil, but rather finds the means to put things back in their place.

Give me a soul that knows not boredom, grumblings, sighs and laments, nor excess of stress, because of that obstructing thing called "I."

Grant me, O Lord, a sense of good humour.

Allow me the grace to be able to take a joke to discover in life a bit of joy, and to be able to share it with others.

The Liturgy Committee has asked that we say the Angelus after the dismissal at the end of Mass in common with many Churches in our tradition. The note below refers to the trial period which began sotto voce last Sunday and will continue after the dismissal at Mass through the Christmas season.

Introducing the Angelus in Advent and Christmas

Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of God Incarnate in Jesus Christ. The ancient tradition of the reciting the Angelus is a fitting devotion to focus our minds on this mystery, as we journey towards the Octave of Christmas.

The Angelus is a call and response prayer that commemorates both the Incarnation and the Annunciation, when the birth of Christ, the Son of God, was made known to Mary by the message of an angel. It is also an encouragement for us, the people of God, to follow Mary's singular example of discipleship when she says, "Be it done unto me according to thy word".

The Angelus at High Mass will come after the dismissal and before the postlude. It is not a part of the Mass, but I encourage you to remain in church for it as we journey towards Christmas together. We celebrate the mysteries of the Incarnation each time we gather at Mass—but there is no more fitting time to meditate on Jesus' humanity than the seasons of Advent and Christmas.


FIRST READING

THE GOSPEL

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke (3.10-18)

+ Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

The crowds, who were gathering to be baptized by John, asked him, "What should we do?" In reply John said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?"

He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" 

Dates: 30th November, 7th, 14th & 21st December


Frequencies of God: Walking through Advent with R.S. Thomas by Carys Walsh


