

WEEKLY MUSINGS

Recently I heard a radio interview in which drew listeners back to this time last year when Christmas and New Year wishes flowed saying good riddance to 2020 and here's hoping for a brighter and better 2021! How soon those sentiments changed! Over the past two years there have been many uncertainties and unforeseen circumstances - and uncertainty **is** stressful!

Today in our Advent journey we focus on the faithfulness of Mary. She shares the joy of her vocation with her cousin Elizabeth. Her acceptance of the shattering transitions that God wrought in her life serve as a model for us all. Her initial response to the angelic message that she would be the mother of our Lord was simply, 'How can this be?' How can this be indeed! How can it be that God would come among us. How can it be? Mary asks that question filled with wonder, awe and fear. She bears all the pain of the parent whose life is poured out for others.

There will come the time that Jesus goes missing from the family as they return from the pilgrimage to Jerusalem. They eventually find him in the temple, deep in discussion with the elders. She sees him ridiculed by their neighbours and towns folk. The ask, how can he speak like this when we know his mother, his family, his trade, we know his story!

She comes with other family members to see Jesus but cannot get to him because of the crowds. I wonder if she heard what Jesus said when he was told his family was there: 'My mother and my brothers are those who hear the word of God and do it.'

Then at the foot of the cross while most of the others had abandoned Jesus, she hears her son entrust her into the care of John the beloved disciple. Mary is there to care for the body of her son at the end.

Luke tells us that Mary is with the others in the upper room following the ascension of Jesus. In Mary, God has truly lifted up the lowly – from simple country peasant girl to Mother of our Lord. Advent reminds us that amid all the uncertainty in the world and in our lives, we wait faithfully, with some awe and wonder, to see what God is doing for us, with us, and among us.







COVER ART DETAILS

Art analysis by Naomi Wray, with bibliographic information after that.

Elizabeth meets Mary at the door of her courtyard, with rounded arch the shape of a Moghul dome. Tipping the arch is a Menorah candlestick, reminding us that Elizabeth's husband is the priest Zechariah. That it is the courtyard door and not the house door is indicated by the wall at the right, above which trees and sky can be seen.

To the left of the door is a tree with dry branches, brown and lifeless as Elizabeth's former barren-ness. Two doves on the side wall represent the holiness of both women. Mary wears a red and purple robe, signifying joy and dignity The halo around her head indicates God's presence with her. Unbound hair tells us she is still a maiden, while the elderly Elizabeth has her head fully covered and wears a green garment suggesting new life within. Around her head is a very thin speckled halo.

Indians can understand the need for a pregnant woman to visit her family with the news. In this context, Mary's action in going to visit Elizabeth would suggest that Elizabeth is her nearest female relative.

Frank Wesley began studying at the government school of Arts and Crafts in Lucknow in 1943 continuing to postgraduate study, later joining the teaching staff. Further studies included four years at the Kyoto Art University in *Japan*(1954-58) where he studied art and wood block printing. In 1958 he joined the Art Institute of *Chicago* where he studied modern art. He returned to India in 1960.

His work has been internationally recognised. He designed the urn for Mahatma Gandhi's ashes. Five of his paintings were included in the 1950 *Holy Year Exhibition* at the Vatican. His "The Blue Madonna" was used as the first UNICEF Christmas card.

In 1973, he emigrated to *Australia* with his family. He continued to paint prolifically until his death in 2002.
