




A reading from the book of Genesis

THE EPISTLE: Romans 4.1-5, 13-17


A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans.

What are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. For what does the scripture say? 'Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness.' Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness. For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations') – Abraham believed in the presence of the God who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.



LENTEN READING

Are you looking for that Lenten read that's just right for you? We have a wide selection of Lent books this year, including the Archbishop of Canterbury's recommendation: **Failure: What Jesus Said About Sin, Mistakes and Messing Things** up by Emma Ineson (\$32.95).

Another Lenten book we are also highly recommending is **Hope and the Nearness of God** by Teresa White (\$23). This is a book about hope, which the author argues is central to the meaning of Lent and in turn of Easter. Hope, quite different from optimism, is the most precious spiritual gift. We are surrounded by so many desolate, unhappy, hurting people. They need hope. This is not simply confidence in the future, but confidence that the past, present and future are held in God's hands and that God, in his providence, never abandons us. Hope means to take the next step on the untidy human journey as we discern the 'footprints of God in creation'. It is the realistic way of perceiving the scope of our real human possibilities. Implying courage and patience, it accepts there are things that we cannot change; encourages living constructively in the face of disappointment and discouragement.

WEEKLY REFLECTIONS

Stephen Duckett writes ...

Each of us has a different Lenten journey, the commonality is that Lent is a time of special reflection as we walk towards the Cross of Good Friday and the empty tomb of Easter Sunday.

Lent is sometimes seen as being about giving up things, but increasingly it is also seen as about doing things differently. I have a bit of a problem with both these approaches, as it could be seen that you only have to live an earth-sustaining life, or follow the teachings of Jesus, for forty days a year when, in reality, we should be doing so for 365 days. But habits die hard, and maybe it is good to make a special effort in Lent.

The three readings today remind us of the continuity of Scripture: the role of and promises to Abraham are called out in the reading from Genesis and in the Epistle, and the Matthean Transfiguration story places Jesus alongside Moses and Elijah.

We are truly surrounded by great cloud of witnesses, sent to teach and guide us, and serve as exemplars.

For more than a decade now my Lenten journey has included a mix of reflection and fun called 'Lent Madness' (lentmadness.org/). Every weekday morning, I get an email inviting me to vote on which of two saints, interpreted broadly, should progress to the next round, 'the Saintly Sixteen', and eventually on to the 'Golden Halo'.

The fun part comes in one of the rounds where we learn about the kitsch which surrounds the saints. It is not for everyone, but it is another way we can make our Lenten reflections different from other times of the year.
