

#### **GATHERING IN GOD'S NAME**

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions, only congregations of up to 20 people are permitted to attend public worship, in addition to those officiating at the Mass. Our Archbishop has also advised that services should be led by an organist and cantor only, rather than a choir, and that we should keep conregational hymn singing to a minimum. So, our worship has certainly not yet returned to the way it was. If you can't come to Mass in person, we warmly invite you to join us online each Sunday. Today's Mass will be live-streamed on our FaceBook page, and the following day uploaded to YouTube (https://bit.ly/3aEZVuB).

Please stand for the procession from the West Door. Mass setting: Missa Cantata: A Chant Mass arr. and adapt. Geoffrey Cox.

Celebrant: In the name of the Father, + and of the Son

and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Lord be with you. **And also with you.** 

The celebrant chants the collect for purity.

Let us pray: Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name, through Christ our Lord. **Amen.** 

The cantor sings:

Kyrie eleison, Christe eleison, Kyrie eleison. Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy.

The celebrant introduces the confession:

We are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses.

Silence

Let us then run our race, laying aside every weight and bringing our sins to the Lord in penitence and faith.

Merciful God,
Our maker and our judge,
We have sinned against you
In thought, word, and deed,
And in what we have failed to do:
We have not loved you with our whole heart;
We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves;
We repent and are sorry for all our sins.
Father, forgive us.

through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The presiding bishop pronounces the absolution:


Almighty God, whose apostles Peter and Paul Glorified you in their deaths as in their lives:

#### THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

**THE FIRST READING**: Acts of the Apostles 12:1-11 read by Helen Drummond In those days, King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. After he saw that it pleased some of the people, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread. When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him. The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, "Get up quickly." And the chains fell off his wrists. The angel said to him, "Fasten your belt and put on your sandals." He did so. Then he said to him, "Wrap your cloak around you and follow me." Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. Then Peter came to himself and said, "Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the people were expecting." Hear the word of the Lord; thanks be to God.

The cantor leads the singing of the Psalm. All are invited to join in the response.

**THE EPISTLE:** The Second Letter Timothy 4:6-8, 17-18

As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing. And also with you.


The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Simon Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven." ### THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

Celebrant: Let us pray for the world and for the Church.

Please kneel for the prayers of the people, led by Di Clark.

After each petition: Lord, in your mercy; hear our prayer.

And at the end: Rest eternal grant to them, O Lord,

and let light + perpetual shine upon them.

Celebrant: Almighty God, you have promised to hear our prayers.

Grant that what we have asked in faith, we may by your grace receive, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

#### THE GREETING OF THE PEACE

The Bishop: We are the body of Christ.

His Spirit is with us.

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

And also with you.

The Propers or a Motet is sung as the altar is prepared, in place of the offertory hymn. No offerings are collected at this point, due to new COVID-19 restrictions, but there will be a retiring collection at the end of the service.

Celebrant: Blessed are you . . . Blessed be God forever.

Pray, my brothers and sisters, that our sacrifice may be acceptable to God, the Almighty Father.

May the Lord accept this sacrifice at your hands to the praise and glory of his name,

for our good and the good of all his Church.

### THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

Celebrant: The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The celebrant continues the prayer, leading to

Celebrant: As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray.

Celebrant: We who are many are one body,

for we all share in the one bread.

All remaining kneeling as the cantor sings:

Agnus Dei, Lamb of God,

qui tollis peccata mundi: you take away the sin of the world:

miserere nobis. have mercy on us.

Agnus Dei, Lamb of God,

qui tollis peccata mundi: you take away the sin of the world:

dona nobis pacem. grant us your peace.

Celebrant: Behold the Lamb of God,

who takes away the sins of the world.

Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you,

but only say the word and I shall be healed.

The sacrament is shared, in one kind (due to the pandemic we no longer share the common cup). Those who are accustomed to making their communion in any Christian tradition are most welcome to receive. All are warmly invited to come forward for a blessing. Please observe spatial distancing of 1.5m at all times, approaching the altar rail via the centre aisle and returning via the side aisles.

All then stand to join in singing the hymn:

- 1. 'Thou art the Christ, O Lord, the Son of God, most high!'
  For ever be adored
  That name in earth and sky,
  In which, though mortal strength may fail,
  The saints of God at last prevail.
- 2. O surely he was blest
  With blessedness unpriced,

#### SUNDAY AND WEEKDAY MASSES - ATTENDING IN PERSON

The West Door of the church is once again open to the public, for congregations of up to 20 people. But our worship is by no means back to the way it was before the pandemic. Many parishioners are choosing to remain at home, and join the Mass by YouTube or on FaceBook.

If you would like to come back to church, however, you are welcome to join us in person for one or more of the following Masses:

- Monday Friday 7.15am
- Wednesday 1.15pm
- Saturday 9.00am
- Sunday 10.30am (the "book a pew" service)

Now that we can have 20 people at Mass, the weekday services have plenty of capacity, so you don't need to let us know if you are coming. Sadly this is not yet the case on Sundays, because of the limited numbers allowed to attend public worship. So, you must "book a pew" for Sunday Mass at this stage. Booking your pew is a very simple procedure, but you must plan ahead, or you may risk being turned away from church (something none of us would want to happen).

# Very important: you need to "book a pew" at least 48 hours (2 days) in advance of any service you would like to attend.

Make sure to leave your name and phone number, indicate which service you hope to attend, specify the date or dates of the service(s) you would like to attend. If all the places are taken, don't worry, we will call you to let you know. If you don't hear back from us, just come.
