Ezekiel 3.22-end


A reading from the book of the Prophet Ezekiel.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

About that time King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. ²He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. ³After he saw that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread.) ⁴When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. ⁵While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him.

⁶The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. ⁷Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, 'Get up quickly.' And the chains fell off his wrists. ⁸The angel said to him, 'Fasten your belt and put on your sandals.' He did so. Then he said to him, 'Wrap your cloak around you and follow me.' ⁹Peter* went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. ¹⁰After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly

the angel left him. ¹¹Then Peter came to himself and said, 'Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting.'

At 11.00am only The Angelus is led and sung by the Celebrant. The church bell rings three times during the recitation of the Hail Mary, and nine times during the final Collect.


New Release!

The Rebel Christ by Michael Coren

In The Rebel Christ Michael Coren explores what Jesus said about the pressing issues of his and our day. Jesus may not have mentioned sexuality, but welcomed outsiders and the marginalized; he never spoke of social security systems, but did criticize the wealthy and complacent and

called for the poor to be protected; he didn't side with the powerful but did condemn those who judged and exploited others and turned their eyes away from those in need and from the cry for justice. This was Jesus the rebel, Christ the radical, who turned the world upside down and who today demands that his followers do the same.

Weekly Reflection

Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?' John 21.15

In our church dedicated to St Peter, though we didn't hear it this year, we are familiar with the passage from John 21 in which the risen Jesus asks Peter if he loves him and tells him to feed his sheep. We know that Peter is given the opportunity to answer the question three times, as a moment of redemption after the threefold denial of Jesus which Peter had made at the end of Jesus' life (a denial that had been predicted by Jesus just moments after Peter had recognised him as the Messiah and Son of God). We know that Peter got it wrong as often as he got it right, indeed usually *just after* he'd got it right, as in the refusal to accept Jesus' prediction of his own death. In John 21 we have another story of misunderstanding and the prediction of a death, this time Peter's:

'when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.' (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) John 21.18 & 19

As we are often reminded, Peter is anything but an idealised figure in the gospels: the various moments at which we see that make him *real* as well as true. Like David and so many other biblical heroes Peter serves as a warning that privilege and even divine election will not guarantee soundness of understanding or action. But Peter's pre-eminence among the disciples makes his repeated failures and misunderstanding of Jesus representative, universal: if even the favoured Simon, the rock of the church and recipient of divine revelation, did not get it, then we may somewhat exculpate ourselves for falling short too, ...as long as we get up again after falling.

And we recall that Peter, again like David and so many others, stands as a sign of God's ready willingness to bestow forgiveness on the imperfect. As soon as Peter has been quickly dismissed for words better left unsaid ('Get behind me, Satan'), in the very next episode of the gospel Jesus selects him, along with two others, to witness the Transfiguration, a foretaste of the resurrection itself, the revelation of God's life. So Peter, far from being punished for his misguided words, is immediately granted a glimpse of the glorified Christ. And he immediately blunders again in interpretation of what he sees, wanting to build booths to contain the vision: we so often want to do that, to box the thing up neatly and safely to control it. But we must surely be heartened by each of Peter's blundering forward steps: God's grace always triumphs and makes up with vision that which is lacking in dogged interpretation. Perhaps it is a lesson of the kingdom that the vision is always to be preferred to the interpretation.

Seeing and recognising Jesus, and acting on the seeing, which is faith, and risking life on that vision, all this is accessible to all of us, as each of these stories of human imperfection and God's generosity surely demonstrates. Peter is the prince of the apostles not because he is a holy superman, but precisely because he falls short and keeps going, keeps allowing the vision to lead him past the weaknesses of his understanding.


