

The celebrant pronounces the Absolution.

Almighty God, who has promised forgiveness to all who turn to him in faith: pardon you and set you free from all your sins, strengthen you in all goodness and keep you in eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

A reading from book of the prophet Isaiah.


¹² Who has measured the waters in the hollow of his hand and marked off the heavens with a span, enclosed the dust of the earth in a measure, weighed the mountains in scales the hills in a balance? ¹³ Who has directed the spirit of the Lord, as his has instructed him? ¹⁴ Whom did he consult for his enlightenment, who taught him the path of justice? Who taught him knowledge, showed him the way of understanding? ¹⁵ Even the nations are like a drop from a bucket, are accounted as dust on the scales; see, he takes up the isles like fine dust. ¹⁶ Lebanon would not provide fuel enough, are its animals enough for a burnt-offering. ¹⁷ All the nations are as nothing before him; are accounted by him as less than nothing and emptiness. ²⁷ Why do you say, O Jacob, speak, O Israel, 'My way is hidden from the Lord, my right is disregarded by my God'? ²⁸ Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting

God, Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; understanding is unsearchable. ²⁹ He gives power to the faint, strengthens the powerless. ³⁰ Even youths will faint and be weary, the young will fall exhausted; ³¹ but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, shall walk and not faint.


The Celebrant offers the blessing and the Deacon dismisses the congregation:

WEEKLY REFLECTIONS


Today is Trinity Sunday. Trinity has become a near universally accepted way of speaking about the God of the Christians – our God. This is interesting because the word 'Trinity' does not appear in the Bible. The word Trinity, according to some sources, was coined by Tertullian who writing in the late second and early third centuries. Trinity tries to point to the Christian experience of God, not just what we think God might be like.

Many have tried to imagine, describe or depict the Trinity. A contemporary work that stands out for me is by David Hetland who was commissioned to create a stained glass window for a Lutheran Church in the United States.

Hetland's work is bursting with colour and movement. Three circles interlocked in a vertical pattern each contain symbolic references that overflow from one circle to the other. The uppermost circle depicts images

of the six days of creation, and is topped by a vision of the New Jerusalem. Around the perimeter of the circle are the words from scripture, 'In the beginning,' and, 'the breath of life.'

In the centre circle the words, 'resurrection and the life,' emblazon the image of a city depicting the disorder of human life. Superimposed upon the city are twelve trees representing discipleship. These trees are sustained by a pool of water in the lower circle. Around the perimeter of this circle are the words, 'born of water and the spirit.'



Three interlocked circles are a traditional way of symbolizing the Trinity, but within that setting Hetland shows the passionate, overflowing love of God. For example, Jesus does not stay in his own little circle but is shown ascending to the Father freed from the wooden cross that intersects the work. From the wound in his palm flows not blood but living water which pours into the pool at the bottom of the lower circle from which the trees of discipleship grow. It is a dynamic work filled with the energy of our creative, sustaining, and empowering God.
