GATHERING IN GOD'S NAME

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, only congregations of up to 20 people are permitted to attend public worship. If you can't come to Mass in person, we warmly invite you to join us online. The 10.30am Mass is now live-streamed on St Peter's FaceBook page, or from around 3pm the service will have been uploaded to YouTube (https://bit.ly/3aEZVuB).

Celebrant: In the name of the Father, + and of the Son

and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

The celebrant chants the collect for purity.

Let us pray: Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name, through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The cantor sings: Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy.

The celebrant introduces the confession:

'Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' Jesus said: 'This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: you shall love your neighbour as yourself.'

Silence

Let us therefore bring our sins before the one true God, in penitence and faith.

Merciful God, our maker and our judge, we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, and in what we have failed to do: we have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves; we repent and are sorry for all our sins. Father, forgive us. Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The celebrant pronounces the absolution:

Almighty God,
Who has promised forgiveness of sins
to all those who turn to him in faith:
+ pardon you and set you free from all your sins,
strengthen you in all goodness
and keep you in eternal life,
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Gloria.

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will.

We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory,
Lord God, heavenly King,
O God, almighty Father.

Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son,

For ever and ever. Amen.


THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

THE FIRST READING: Exodus 34:4b-6, 8-9 read by Helen Drummond Moses rose early in the morning and went up on Mount Sinai, as the Lord had commanded him, and took in his hand the two tablets of stone. The Lord descended in the cloud and stood with him there, and proclaimed the name, "The Lord." The Lord passed before Moses, and proclaimed, "The Lord, the Lord, a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness." And Moses quickly bowed his head toward the earth, and worshipped. He said, "If now I have found favour in your sight, O Lord, I pray, let the Lord go with us. 

The sacrament is shared, in one kind (we no longer share the common cup). Those who are accustomed to making their communion in any Christian tradition are most welcome to receive. All are warmly invited to come forward for a blessing. Please observe spatial distancing of 1.5m at all times, approaching the altar rail via the centre aisle and returning via the side aisles.

At the conclusion of the communion of the people, there is a time of silent prayer. All then stand to join in singing the Post-communion hymn:

- 1. Holy, holy! Lord God Almighty! Early in the morning our song shall rise to thee; Holy, holy! Merciful and mighty! God in three Persons, blessèd Trinity.
- 2. Holy, holy! All saints adore thee, Casting down their golden crowns around the glassy sea; Cherubim and seraphim falling down before thee, Which wert, and art, and evermore shalt be.
- 3. Holy, holy! Lord God Almighty! All thy works shall praise thy name, in earth, and sky, and sea; Holy, holy! Merciful and mighty, God in three Persons, blessèd Trinity.

SUNDAY AND WEEKDAY MASSES - ATTENDING IN PERSON

The West Door of the church is once again open to the public, for congregations of up to 20 people. But our worship is by no means back to the way it was before the pandemic. Many parishioners are choosing to remain at home, and join the Mass by YouTube or on FaceBook. If you would like to come back to church, however, you are welcome to join Fr Philip, Fr Greg, Fr Ken and Fr Hugh in person for one or more of the following Masses:

- Monday Friday 7.15am
- Wednesday 1.15pm
- Saturday 9.00am
- Sunday 10.30am (the "book a pew" service)

Now that we can have 20 people at Mass, the weekday services have plenty of capacity. But sadly, you cannot just turn up like you used to on a Sunday, because of the relatively small numbers of people allowed to attend public worship. So, you need to "book a pew" for Sunday Mass at this stage. Booking your pew is a very simple procedure, but you must plan ahead, or you may risk being turned away from church (something none of us would want to happen).

Very important: you must "book a pew" at least 48 hours (2 days) in advance of any service you would like to attend.
