





Weekly Reflections

Let the people's praise you, O God; Let all the people's praise you. Psalm 67:5 Last Monday, a number of us from St Peter's travelled to Holy Trinity Cathedral, Wangaratta, to attend Fr Rob Whalley's Requiem Mass. It was a deep, rich service overlayed with varied music, psalms, prayers, all centring on Love - on the Eucharist. Ken Goodger, the Dean, made much mention of the hospitality that was always found at number 7, The Close, where Fr Rob Whalley and Fr John Davis have lived now for many years. Whenever I have asked to be reminded of their address, John says: seven, rhymes with heaven.

Hospitality, comes from the Latin and ancient Greco-Roman practice of recognising the divine right of the guest or foreigner, and the divine duty of the host. There's mutuality here, of honour and respect. A giving and a receiving, and a way to do each.

In assorted ways, the readings this Sunday touch on the hospitality of God, and our response. On what it means to be gathered in, to be blessed by God, to be offered and to receive mercy. It's the story of the Canaanite woman, a Gentile who challenges Jesus, and his own change of response that touches me most.

When John and Rob left St Peter's in 2010, John having served as our 9th Vicar, I remember asking Rob, would he prefer to be called Rob or Robert? And he said Robert. But in the following years, I noticed that Rob was being used a lot more often by people. On the service sheet for his Requiem Mass he was given 3 names: Rob, Bob and Robert. Such was his uncapturable personhood.

But it also reveals his passion for 'Being Alive', in the Stephen Sondheim sense. Following communion, from the musical Company, we heard sung:

Somebody need me too much Somebody know me too well Somebody pull me up short And put me through hell And give me support For being alive Make me alive

Authentic encounter between persons was something that Rob Whalley was passionate about. Lifechanging and vital was his living out and advocacy for the LGBTQIA+ community. But as with his challenges of Parkinson's and Cancer, these never wholly defined him. Rob only made sense when you talked with him in that present encounter. And this gift of being able to hold together so many


selves, frustrating sometimes, was made coherent and meaningful because of his relationship with Christ.

The Canaanite woman in Matthew's Gospel addresses Jesus directly. In the story, she is objectified, defined by her gender and by her ethnicity, without even being designated one proper name. She is truly an outsider. And further to this, what a shocking analogy Jesus uses: 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' And yet, how impressively she meets his remark. With a quick retort that contains fierce dignity, self- respect and perseverance, she pulls him up short. Whatever the nature is in what's happening here, theologians discuss and debate over it, I think that Jesus is shown to change his mind. He goes from pushing her away at one moment, to then embracing her tight and close into the very heart of God. He hears her. And he is big enough, containable enough, hospitable enough, to change his mind. Such an authentic encounter of relationship with Jesus, in God, enables real healing.
