
THE INTRODUCTORY RITES

A reading from the book of Wisdom





Weekly Reflections

Wisdom, radiant and unfading, will be found sitting at the gate: giving her gifts to those worthy of her, to those who seek her. Easily discerned by those who love her, she seeks to give her gifts to everyone who seeks her.

The gate of a city in the ancient Near East isn't what we would expect: once designed for defence of the city walls, for most cities and villages this is the space where the people gather, where sales are transacted, where civic business takes place and local gossip is shared. The gate of an ancient city is perhaps the busiest part of it – and this is where wisdom waits for her people. Wisdom waits in the midst of such busyness, in all the nobilities and injustices of human experience.

Of course, wisdom is more than knowledge and cleverness, more than even insight and discernment. Wisdom in the ancient world is the presence of God in creation. In the book of Proverbs (8.11-31) Wisdom herself tells us that she was with God at the beginning of creation, working alongside like a master worker as the heavens and earth are wrought from nothing. The earliest Christian tradition tells us that this Wisdom figure is Jesus, the Word, who was with God and was God, and all things came into being through him (John 1.1-3). This is the figure who is found by those who seek, who sits in the busiest and most demanding parts of our lives waiting for us.

Keep awake, Jesus tells us in this week's gospel. The kingdom of heaven is open to the wise, the careful, to those who are prepared. This is, of course, a parable: designed to be a stark contrast, a challenge to the Pharisees' own arbitrary determination of who is worthy of God's love, a determination based not on God's will but on their own. The Kingdom, Jesus tells us, is not for those who, like the Pharisees, try to shore up their own position by taking from others. It is for those who are wise: who have found Wisdom who has, all this time, been sitting in the most obvious place possible.

Where do we find that creative presence of God's love in our own lives? In a world that seems increasingly to be tearing itself apart, we find that love of God in those small actions of human care and love and sacrifice so often overlooked. We find it in God's presence in the suffering, in God's attempts to break through the hard hearts of warlords and rulers. We find it in the prayers of our heart and of our community. We find it in the silent, central presence of the Eucharist and the community of love which forms around it. We find it in the city gate: in the demands of a busy and hurting world. We find it wherever we look for it, because it has already called us, already claimed us.


Wisdom is radiant and unfading, easily discerned by those who love her – for Wisdom, the very presence and love of God will be found sitting in the gate.

Under Jerusalem by Andrew Lawler

In 1863, a French senator arrived in Jerusalem hoping to unearth relics dating to biblical times.
