

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

Micah 3.5-end

A reading from book of the prophet Micah.

Thus says the Lord concerning the prophets who lead my people astray, who cry 'Peace' when they have something to eat, but declare war against those who put nothing into their mouths. Therefore it shall be night to you, without vision, and darkness to you, without revelation. The sun shall go down upon the prophets, and the day shall be black over them;

the seers shall be disgraced, and the diviners put to shame; they shall all cover their lips, for there is no answer from God. But as for me, I am filled with power, with the spirit of the Lord, and with justice and might, to declare to Jacob his transgression and to Israel his sin.

Hear this, you rulers of the house of Jacob and chiefs of the house of Israel, who abhor justice and pervert all equity, who build Zion with blood and Jerusalem with wrong! Its rulers give judgement for a bribe, its priests teach for a price, its prophets give oracles for money; yet they lean upon the Lord and say, 'Surely the Lord is with us! No harm shall come upon us.' Therefore because of you Zion shall be ploughed as a field; Jerusalem shall become a heap of ruins, and the mountain of the house a wooded height.

Jesus answered them, 'Beware that no one leads you astray. For many will come in my name, saying, "I am the Messiah!" and they will lead many astray. And you will hear of wars and rumours of wars; see that you are not alarmed; for this must take place, but the end is not yet. For nation will rise

against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and there will be famines and earthquakes in various places: all this is but the beginning of the birth pangs.

Then they will hand you over to be tortured and will put you to death, and you will be hated by all nations because of my name. Then many will fall away, and they will betray one another and hate one another. And many false prophets will arise and lead many astray. And because of the increase of lawlessness, the love of many will grow cold. But anyone who endures to the end will be saved. And this good news of the kingdom will be proclaimed throughout the world, as a testimony to all the nations; and then the end will come.





Weekly Reflections

Reflections, St Peter's Eastern Hill Pentecost 23, 5/11/2023

Patricia Routledge's 'Hyacinth' in the 90's British sitcom *Keeping up Appearances*, presents an hilarious take on the frailty of human nature and the folly of pretending to be something you are not. Hyacinth is tormented by the fear of her working class background being revealed; presenting herself as a woman of superior breeding and class. Her over-bearing manner exasperates and intimidates everybody she knows.

The series' huge success reflects the way Hyacinth exposes the narcissistic streak in human nature which continually seeks admiration from others, in such a way that we can laugh – not only at other's vain pretensions, but sometimes in recognition of the burgeoning vanity within ourselves.

Some of Jesus' strongest criticism was levelled at hypocritical behaviour: in today's Gospel portion it's those insincere scribes and Pharisees who seek undue respect for feigning piety and holiness of life that draws Jesus' ire.

True humility, on the other hand, recognises that everything we have is a gift from God: every breath that we take, the earth upon which we stand, the vast reaches of the cosmos... St Francis said 'We are what we are before God, and nothing more' and I like to add *and nothing less*.

To learn to know ourselves in all the complexities of our nature- the faults and weaknesses, sins and fears, gifts and talents, virtues and strengths is a life-long journey, best taken in the company of Jesus the Compassionate. As we gradually shed our masks and allow our defensive coverings to fall away our authentic

selves become more visible; we no longer need to hide behind false personae; we can be comfortable just being ourselves, knowing ourselves as God's children. This is humility.

Humility is a core ingredient of peace, because the humble do not need to take what belongs to others, have the absolute best of everything, feel superior, or have the last word. A little more humility in those making decisions regarding the wars wracking our planet today would see them listening a little more keenly to each others' needs, and less strident about their rights.


We are all praying for peace. The Third Order of the Society of St Francis is calling for people to join them in one minute's prayer for peace each evening at 9pm: will you join us?
